BIG GUNS SCRAPPED

ESCHERICH-BACH, Germany, June 1943 in the German siege of Sevastopol in the Crimea, and the 'Big Bertha' of the Second World War was being scrapped. Hitler ordered the guns built at the Krupp war plant in Essen. One was used in the attack on the city of Antwerp in 1940. The other had been held in reserve for a contemplated attack on Gibraltar.

APPOINTED PRINCIPAL

Rev. Myron O. Brinton, pastor of the United Baptist Church, Woodstock, N.B., has been appointed the first principal of the United Baptist Bible Training School, Moncton, the newest project of the Maritime Provinces. This appointment was made at the meeting of the board of directors of the school at Moncton last Thursday, but was not made public until it was first announced to Mr. Brinton's church at Woodstock, Sunday. Mr. Brinton is one of the best known and most highly respected ministers of the Maritimes. He is popular as a preacher, director of Young People's camps, and Young People's work generally. He was president of the convention of the Maritime Provinces in 1946-47 and preacher at the convention sermon at the Centennial Convention in 1946. Mr. Brinton has held pastorates at Springfield and Central Church, Halifax, in Nova Scotia, Truro, P.E.I. and Campbellton and his present church at Woodstock in New Brunswick. He has had a remarkable ministry of eight years in Woodstock, during which he has received over 500 new members, more than doubling the membership and has increased the church budget from \$7,000 to \$17,000. Mr. Brinton has his B.A. from Acadia University and B.D. from Rochester Divinity School, Annapolis, Md. He is the son of Mrs. Brinton and the late Capt. Heber Brinton.

Rousing Meeting Of Conservatives At Dundas Hall

Well over one hundred persons crowded the Bridgetown Tuesday Dundas, Kings County, Tuesday night to hear that County's Progressive Conservative candidate, John A. MacDonald of Carleton Place, speak at his party's policy address. The meeting was held at Dundas Hall on June 27th next.

The candidate stressed the wonderful privilege that is ours in having the free franchise and urged his audience to study the policies and know the candidates of both parties and to vote a full vote for the best representation at Ottawa for King's. Citing the long record of public service of George Drew, a former mayor of Guelph, thirteenth Premier of Ontario, and now National Leader of his Party, Mr. MacDonald compared same to that of Prime Minister St. Laurent who had no connection with politics at all until after he was some 60 years of age.

The Fisheries Federation incident at Charlottetown in May was given by the speaker as an illustration of the type of man the Prime Minister is and an illustration of his inexperience in public affairs of this country.

Dominion-Provincial relations, taxation, civil service, social security, veterans' affairs, freight rates, Trans-Canada highway, better roads, Newfoundland-Caribou service, and better mail service for King's were among the subjects ably dealt with by Mr. MacDonald in his address in which he condemned some Liberals for the deliberate lie being spread that Family Allowances will be stopped if a P.C. government is elected on June 27th.

Such falsehoods, he said, are an insight into the calibre of those spreading same, as all Canadians know the stand of the Progressive Conservatives on that subject today. The only change planned is that when the P.C.'s are elected next week that Family Allowances will be on a uniform basis per child and not as now where the children of the larger families are penalized by having their allowances cut in accordance with the number of children in the family.

Mr. MacDonald urged support for his party on the 27th and for himself in Kings, pointing out that he was making no empty election

promises but that on the other hand when elected, he would serve Kings to the best of his abilities. The need exists today, the P.C. candidate stressed, of a new government at Ottawa comprised of men of vision under a forceful and vigorous leader, as George Drew, Major MacDonald and his associates. Dr. A.A. MacDonald of Souris, Philip Matheson M.L.A. of Oyster Bed Bridge, Melvin McQuaid of Souris and Walthen Gaudet of Charlottetown.

All of the speakers said they were proud to associate themselves with John A. MacDonald and spoke of his long record of service already to his native county of King's and urged support for him on Monday next in the interests of the best of that county, long so neglected under the Liberal government, in the next Parliament of Canada.

Mr. John Beaton of Dundas presided over the meeting as chairman. The largely attended and enthusiastic meeting closed with the National Anthem.

ALMOND-GUMDROPP CAKE

Preparation: Have all ingredients at room temperature. Pre-heat oven to 375°F. Line bottoms of two 9-inch layer cake pans with waxed paper.

Ingredients: (Use standard, level measurements)

- 1/2 cup Swiftning

- 2 unbeaten egg whites

- 4 eggs whites

3. Spread pink icing between layers and on top of cooled cake. Decorate with sugared almonds and strips of green gumdrops.

4. Pink icing: Combine in top of a double boiler, 1/2 cups granulated sugar, 2 unbeaten egg whites, 1 1/2 cups light corn syrup and 3 tbsps. water. Beat over hot water with a hand or electric rotary beater. Remove from heat. Quickly beat in 1 tsp. vanilla and 2 or 3 drops of red food coloring.
