CHICAGO, Sept. 10.—Shakespeare still holds the boards as the most popular of playwrights in the country, the Chicago Civic Shakespeare Society said today. Quoting from the annual theatrical index of an amusement magazine the society showed that of the 181 dramatic plays represented during the 1929-30 season, more than the products of Shakespeare than of any other single playwright.

**Colony Draws**  
**Many Farmers**

ROME, Sept. 10. (U.P.)—Italy is colonizing her North African possessions by means of offering concessions of land to farmers from the home country on terms calculated to attract them.  
The policy has been fairly successful, though much remains to be done in Tripolitania. Progress in this colony is revealed from the figures just issued.  
At the end of 1922, there were only 3,812 hectares of land in Tripolitania under cultivation by concessionaires, while at the end of 1930 the figure was 122,031 hectares. The concessionaires at present number 744 families, composed of 2,814 persons. The colonists in Tripolitania own 744 buildings, a part from cattle-sheds, barns, etc. These houses contain 3,182 rooms.  
Tripolitania has 6,796 head of cattle, 825 water wells, capable of supplying 5,093 cubic meters of water per hour.  
There also are nearly a million olive trees, 11,000 vines, over half a million almond trees and 232,000 mulberry trees.

**Quadruplets**  
**To Aid Science**

SAINT JOHN, Sept. 10—On Christmas Day, 1923, an unusual gift was presented to Mr. and Mrs. William T. Mahaney of St. John, N. B., in the form of four smiling babies—now famous Mahaney quadruplets—three girls and a boy. Today these four kiddies are again getting into the headlines, but for a far different reason than their arrival about eight years ago as one of the few recorded births of quadruplets in the history of the Dominion. The four little sets of slim fingers are now being smeared with printer's ink and impressions made on ink glass in an effort to ascertain whether or not it is possible to have two finger prints fundamentally identical.

Debate has waxed warm on this topic for many years. Scientists claim they have proved that it is impossible to have any two finger prints the same. But while debate continues, think what this matter of finger prints means, especially as it is related to the question of lost or kidnapped children.  
Sydney R. Vardon, of Chatham, N. B., graduate of the New York School of Applied Science in ballistics and graphology, came here to secure evidence to substantiate the views of the scientists. He said the evidence secured from the prints of the Mahaney children would mean a lot to the world at large. In cases of kidnapping photos are useless after a few years and only finger prints can tell, he said.

To the children it was a new and pleasant experience. They were all dressed neatly for the experiment, and, of course, they were photographed for the newspapers, but this is nothing new for these youngsters, and they have already been in many fairs and exhibitions. They looked on in amazement as the finger print man, who to them appeared as somewhat of a magician, got out his plate glass, ink roller and finger print cards. Their eyes shone with the light of wonderment as they pressed their tiny fingers on the glassy surface, and to them it was just another new game, rather dirty, but plenty of fun. Little did their youthful minds realize the contribution they were making to criminal science by the prints they were helping to make.

**Gandhi Declines**  
**Social Lion Role**

PORT SAID, Egypt, Sept. 10.—Mahatma Gandhi doesn't intend to play the role of a social lion in London, even on his own birthday.  
He received a wireless message today from Fenner Brockway, militant Socialist champion of India, saying that his British admirers were preparing a birthday party for him on October 2, when the Mahatma will be 62 years old. Gandhi replied: "I don't intend to participate in any social functions in London. Not even a dinner in honor of an old man's birthday."

**No Romance In**  
**Modern Russia**

REGINA, September 10—Romance and blissful happiness of married life, which by the law of fiction should accompany matrimony, are not known in Russia. In an address today before members of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, Dr. W. A. Lincoln, of Calgary, described the impressions he gained during a recent visit to the Soviet land.  
In the first place the bridal couple walk into a bare and sparsely-furnished municipal office, reply to a few questions, decide whether they will adopt the bride or the groom's name or each retain their own, and are declared man and wife. In the next room they are advised by a physician on the subject of birth control. That's all there is to it. No flowers, no wedding gown, no attendants, no music, no ceremony and no honeymoon.

But should things not prove satisfactory, during the same day they both may return to the license bureau, the only stipulation being that they arrive before closing time, and submit any complaints or objections and then be declared divorced, said Dr. Lincoln.  
Home life is not encouraged in Russia. It is not within the teachings of the Soviet. Couples legally may live together and have children—and if so desired the Government will place the children in an institution so they may grow up never to learn of their parents' identities. Divorces in the Russian cities far outnumber weddings, the speaker added.

It takes a learned and experienced economist to do the Russian household shopping. Butter is \$1.50 per pound and eggs are ten cents each. Dr. Lincoln told of one of his friends paying \$9.50 for the laundering of a little wearing apparel, far more than the original cost of the goods.  
There are no games played in Russia, according to Dr. Lincoln. Life is far too serious. There are no parties, dancing only in the theatres, which are not greatly patronized; no home gardens and one rarely sees cultivated flowers.
