## Announces Dates For Junior Ball Championship

Mr. J. B. Carrigan, vice-president M. P. B. A. U. of C. announces dates for the P. E. Island junior baseball championship to be held at Summerside, Charlottetown and St. John's, August 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 1937. These being the only teams registered with vice-president Carrigan on 6, before July first as per instructions issued by him June 20th and in line with rules set down by officials of the other Maritime Provinces and in effect many years.

The series will be the best two out of three games. Games must start not later than 4:30 p. m. and must go into innings to constitute a game. The first game to be at Summerside Wednesday, August 25th, the second at Charlottetown, August 27th and if a third game is necessary a 5 o'clock coin will decide the place, the date being Monday August 30th.

Teams are requested to be requested to get together and agree on a set of umpires for these games, before midnight Tuesday submitting their agreement to Vice-President Carrigan. In case they cannot agree they will send a list of five umpires to the vice-president who will then appoint officials to handle the games.

## Von Cramm Arrives For Tennis Ch'ships

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) BROOKLINE, Mass., Aug. 23—Rain today washed out the start of the United States tennis doubles championships, but the delay until tomorrow was welcomed by at least one major contender, the German Baron Gottfried Von Cramm, who arrived this afternoon from Europe.

Von Cramm, generally ranked as the second greatest amateur in the world, and his doubles partner, Heinrich (Henner) Henkel, are the first German tennis players to play in the United States since the Great War.

Beaten twice this year by top-ranking Donald Budge, and Gene Mako who will defend their United States title, the Teutons hope to reverse the Davis Cup and Wimbledon verdicts.

It's the Baron's first trip to the United States, and he hopes to fulfill two ambitions—to live up to Bill Tilden's prediction that he (Von Cramm) will beat the world's greatest player, and to see a baseball game.

## Max And Joe Not To Meet This Year

NEW YORK, Aug. 23—Steps to steam up a lagging interest in the heavyweight title match between Joe Louis and Tommy Farr of England at the Yankee Stadium were taken by Promoter Mike Jacobs today.

He announced definitely they will not be a meeting this year between Max Schmeling and Thursday night's winner. Schmeling had hoped to sign for a bout either in late September or early October.

The Jacobs announcement said two of the principal factors in calling off negotiations were the lateness of the season and the desire of Louis, who has been in almost constant training this year for a good long rest.

Julian Black, one of Louis' managers, said the brown bomber would sail Sept. 5 for a month's vacation in London and Paris.

As soon as he heard that, Joe Jacobs, Schmeling's American representative, said the Teuton would return to Germany at once. Schmeling obviously was disappointed at the latest development but expects to land his delayed title shot by next June.

His failure to get definite assurance of a match with the Detroit negro marked the end of his sixth fruitless trans-Atlantic crossing in quest of the championship since he last year. Louis into submission last year.

United States and British sports writers, delighted to get chance to run amuck with an immediate danger of English title laws, have tagged the Welsh rarebit with one-ounce gloves as:

A mug for a left, a sap for a right, a sucker for a hook.

A triple threat fighter—two hands and a head trained in the art of bumping and butting.

Farr, actually quite a nice fellow in our estimation, hardly knows which way to turn with the sneer and quips flying about his neck. One day he'll laugh them all off; the next he'll be mad and threaten to beat anybody's block off as he did Maxie Baer, who got a little too funny in the public prints recently in so far as the Welshman was concerned.

"They'll sing a different tune when I get through with Louis," claims Tonypandy Tommy. "I'll win as sure as I get angry. Just wait."

Probably the chief cause of most of his trouble in his camp is his quarrel with his manager, Broadbitt. Since they came over for the fight they have spoken to each other only when necessary. The disagreement is that Farr doesn't want Broadbitt to manage him any longer, believing he can do just as well for himself and profit thereby from a bigger purse. Broadbitt, whose contract as manager runs until March 1, doesn't care who knows his opinion of his fighter.

"Farr can't possibly lose because he's too much of a scoundrel," says Broadbitt.

So the Farr camp is not exactly a happy household. Except for "Job Lot" Churchill, a pal who has been with him ever since he started fighting, he here would be misery for Tonypandy Tommy. "Job Lot," also called "Barnacle Bill," has a wooden leg. He carries an extra one as a spare in case of emergency and delights all the tribes who come around searching for developments and new names to call Farr.

Javelin Mark Beaten

OTTAWA, Aug. 22—(CP)—The Canadian record for javelin throwing was held by Jimmy Courtwright of Ottawa today. His muscular right arm propelled the spear 214 feet and two inches here yesterday to beat the previous high mark by 51 feet and eight inches.

Courtwright, who represented Canada at the Olympic Games in Berlin last summer, bettered the record mark of 207 1-2 feet made by Stan Lay of New Zealand at Hamilton in 1930.

## To Tighten Control Over Private Wealth

TOKYO, Aug. 23—The Japanese Government today made public plans to tighten its control over the private wealth of the Empire to further its program for placing Japan under a wartime economic regime.

Okino Kaya, Finance Minister, said the Government "finds it necessary to readjust investment capital in order to increase funds available for expansion of munitions industries and foreign trade.

To meet immediate needs of the expanding army and navy operations in China, the government decided to issue shortly 200,000 yen (about \$58,000,000) in deficit bonds.

The Finance Minister assured financiers the government has no intention of compelling business to underwrite its national defence bonds with its fixed reserves or of establishing "unreasonable capital control."

But Kaya added that a banking syndicate, with the official bank of Japan as the leading member, was considering voluntary measures for the readjustment of capital.

A high official of the Tokyo stock exchange said:

"Control of industrial funds, naturally result in ample supplies of funds for industries connected with the present situation, such as the munitions and export industries. These will benefit from restrictions on the expansion of non-urgent industries.
