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IN MEMORIAM

MRS. DONALD STEWART

An aged and highly esteemed resident of Hartsville passed to her eternal reward on March 30th, in the person of Margaret Nicholson, relict of the late Donald Stewart, Hartsville. The deceased was born in the Isle of Sky, Scotland, in the year 1835 and thus had reached the ripe old age of 86 years. In the year 1841 she came to this country with her parents and has resided here ever since. Throughout her long life she took a deep interest in all that pertained to the upbuilding of the community and ever stood for the things that were best. For forty years she was a consistent member of the Hartsville Presbyterian Church. During the last few years of her life her health was not good and she was confined to her room, a good part of her time. Through these years of her illness and of old age she was tenderly cared for by her daughter Miss Margaret. When the end came she was found ready and she died as she had lived trusting in the merits of a crucified Redeemer. Mrs. Stewart leaves to mourn the loss of a kind and loving mother one son and four daughters. The one son is Murdoch of Hartsville and the daughters are Miss Flora and Mrs. Annie Sherman both of Lowell, Mass. Mrs. J. H. Newman, Elmwood, P. E. I., and Miss Margaret at home. Besides these she leaves a stepson in the Canadian West, and a stepdaughter in Picton, N. S., and also three brothers viz: Dr. M. J. Nicholson, Washington, D. DUBLIN, May 5.—A sergeant and seven constables were ambushed and killed a short distance outside of Rathmore, County Kerry. Only one man in the party escaped. He was uninjured.

Shooting at Funeral

LEMERICK, May 5.—The funeral of Henry Clancy, who was shot and killed here Saturday night, gave rise to an incident today which resulted in the police employing fire-arms, killing one civilian and dangerously wounding another. When the coffin, draped with the Sinn Fein flag was on the way to the cemetery, the police objected to the formation of the procession and turned a number of the people aside. Later the procession was formed again. The police returned and some members of the funeral cortege, seeing them coming, ran across a field. Officials state these persons refused to halt and the police fired at them.

Four Men Killed

DUBLIN, May 4.—Four policemen were killed and two wounded in an ambush at Tourmakeady. An investigating party encountered a number of members of the "Irish Republican Army" in the Bantry mountain and a fight ensued, after which the military forces recovered the body of one of the republicans and captured another, who was armed with a shot gun.
