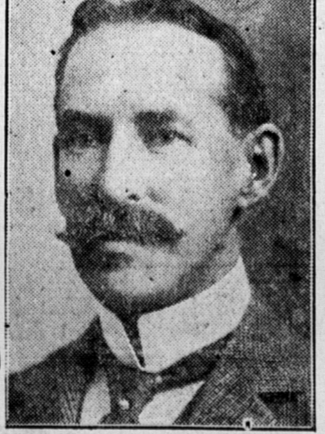
AUSTRALIANS COMING.

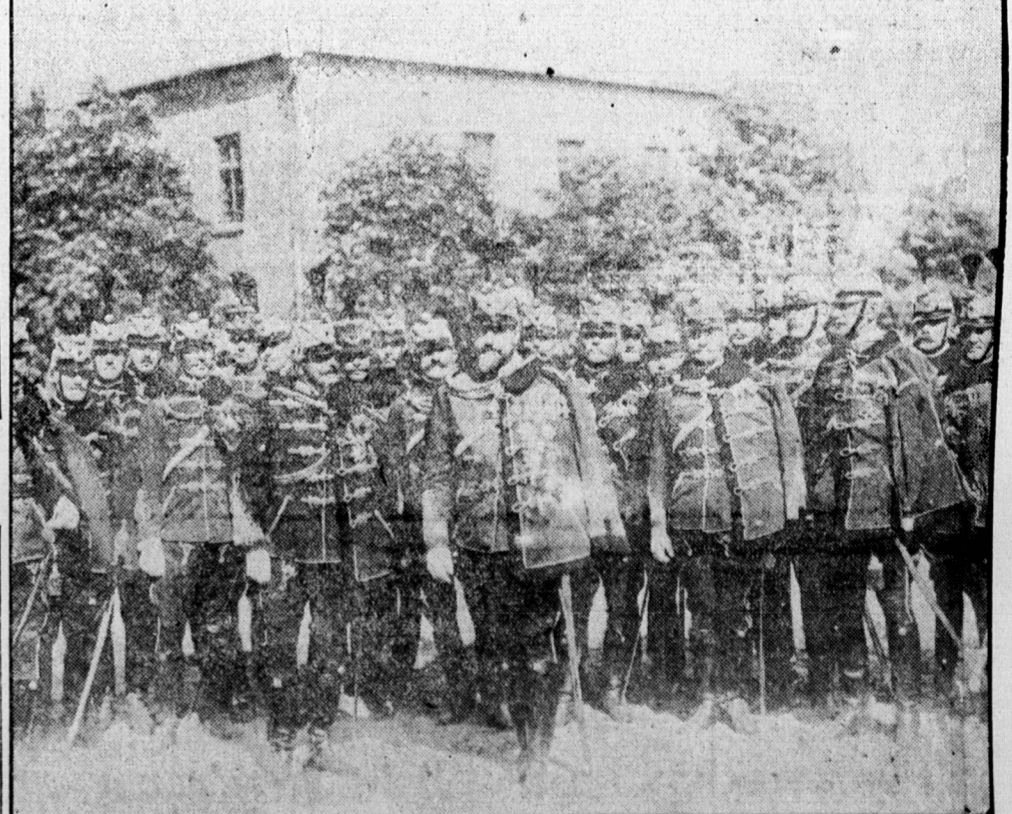
