FOX NOTES.

A usually well-informed correspondent writes:—

There is at present in this city a gentleman from the United States who is making a close investigation of the fox industry at the instigation of a party of American capitalists, who will, if the facts submitted to them are satisfactory, build a ranch here and engage in the business on a large scale.

The writer had an interview with him yesterday and the information so far received by the Americans is so good that he feels sure that the capital will be forthcoming in any quantity.

From various sources we are informed that the fall months will witness an unprecedented interest taken in this industry.

The magazines and newspapers abroad are all taking up the black fox industry and the amount of publicity from this source should result in interesting hundreds of thousands of dollars of foreign capital.

Only the other day one of the Fox Exchanges sold \$18,000 worth of stock in one block to American investors, and during the past week a firm in Boston have underwritten a company capitalized at \$100,000 for the raising of black foxes.

These are but the signs of the times and should lead to a feeling of great confidence in the fox industry.

There is no doubt but that the predictions of Mr. Dalton and others as to the price of 1913 foxes will be verified.

There is hardly an option for sale today. What then will it be when the months of October, November and December arrive? Prices will surely soar to the \$20,000.00 mark per pair.

Last year during the months of July and August the industry was comparatively quiet, very few sales being made, the big demand came during the fall months.

History will surely repeat itself in this case and the fall of 1913 will bring in more capital to this Province than ever before.

THE WEATHER THE TEMPERATURE TIDE, MOON ETC

TORONTO, Aug. 2.—Southerly and southwesterly winds, becoming fresh or strong, unsettled, with showers or thunderstorms. The tide will be high this morning at 9.39, tomorrow at 10.37, and Monday at 11.33; it will be high tonight at 11.30, tomorrow at 12 and Tuesday morning at 12.50.

The sun sets this evening at 7.28, tomorrow at 7.27 and Monday at 7.26; it rises tomorrow morning at 4.43, Monday at 4.45 and Tuesday at 4.45.

The moon sets tonight at 8.05 and tomorrow at 8.31.

The last quarter of the moon was on Saturday, July 26 at 5.59 a. m. There will be a new moon on Saturday, Aug. 2nd at 8.58 a. m.

The length of today will be fourteen hours and forty-eight minutes, and of tomorrow fourteen hours and forty-three minutes.

THE WEATHER.—Yesterday was beautifully clear with light breezes increasing to southeasterly winds, cloudy at night.

The temperature at three o'clock this morning by the Rexall Store tested thermometer with a northern exposure was fifty-eight degrees above zero and with a southern exposure was sixty degrees above.

The highest temperature recorded yesterday was seventy-one degrees above zero and the lowest was sixty-two above. The lowest previous night was fifty-three above. At nine a. m. it was sixty-four above and at nine p. m. sixty-two above.

And now the writer feels sad not only at the departure of this friend but principally, as we fear at the decline of that principle of life in our religion, viz., "The Fatherhood of God" which he so highly praised.—Com.

AMERICAN GUNBOAT UNDER CHINESE FIRE

HAN-KOW, July 31.—Northern troops captured the Hu-kow forts Friday after a fierce bombardment from a gunboat at Oliphant's Island. The troops landed below the forts under cover of the bombardment and rushed the position at nightfall. The northern troops will now advance on Nan-chang.

The United gunboat Quiros, which went to Yo-chow to invest gate the recent firing on a Standard Oil Company vessel, was also fired upon. The commander of the Quiros, however, being reluctant to engage in a combat, withdrew his vessel.
