Tents as Shelters in Fierce Blizzard

ENGLISHTOWN, Oct. 24.—A few hours before dawn this morning a great blizzard of wind-driven snow swept over this district. The thermometer stood at the freezing point, and the wind howled across the great open spaces in a 40-mile gale, lashing the country mercilessly for six hours. A great deal of the snow melted as it fell, thus causing puddles and rivulets of water, over which his lying from four to ten inches of snow.

In the towns and villages the refugees of the recent bush fires are comparatively comfortable, but the plight of many families in the outlying agricultural districts is a different matter. It is not possible to haul more than empty vehicles. Not only this, but much of the live stock was burned, and some settlers are with out horses to make an attempt to haul in lumber for shacks.

Two weeks have passed since the disaster, and a tour through the devastated area fails to reveal the presence of Government lumber for the construction of shelters for the homeless in the outlying sections, where the unfortunate sufferers have no haven in this hour of emergency.

It is true that many carloads of lumber have arrived at central points along the main line of the railway, but it is also true that this is available only for sufferers who can at least find shelter in other dwellings in case of such an emergency as developed with the storm that broke before dawn today.

PEACE CONFERENCE AT LAUSANNE NOV. 13

Whether the conference will have to be further delayed depends upon the British political situation. France is urging the necessity of holding the meeting as soon as possible because the Turks are becoming daily more restless, officials say, and will not regard the allied promises as definite until the peace meeting is actually under way.

40 Hours Adrift in Motor Boat

HALIFAX, Oct. 24.—After being adrift in a small motor boat with his gasoline tank empty for two nights and a day and without food and water for that period two residents of St. Margaret's Bay, Alan Morash and Gordon Schaffer, were picked up by the Furness liner Barrymore at noon on Saturday about twenty miles south west of Sambro. The men were landed here on the Barrymore's arrival several hours later, none the worse for their experience.

The men were on their way from Mahong to St. Margaret's Bay at the time their gasoline tank, which had sprung a leak, emptied and were within three miles of their destination. They left Mahong about seven o'clock and expected to reach home about midnight. On the way the gasoline tank started leaking in some unaccountable manner without oars or sail they had to be contented with drifting and there being an offshore wind they were carried out of the bay. All Friday they continued drifting seaward and for the best part of the day snow fell. Huddled in a small house in the forward part of the boat the men maintained a vigilant lookout for a passing craft. The weather was cold and they were feeling the pangs of hunger.

Not a craft was sighted until towards noon on Saturday when the Barrymore hove in sight and seeing the signal of distress, a piece of flooring of their boat which the men had rigged, changed their course and tore down upon the boat, taking it in tow. Coffee and food was passed out to the two men. While being towed the motor boat sprang a leak and the two men had to frequently bail it out while they were being towed to port.

Political Outlook Holds up Sessions

PARIS, Oct. 24.—Lord Curzon has informed Premier Poincare that owing to the political situation in England he thinks it impossible that the Turkish peace conference can convene before November 13. Lord Curzon suggests Lausanne as the meeting place.

Soviets on Scene

MOSCOW, Oct. 23.—Insisting upon unrestricted participation in all conference regarding the Near East, Russia has sent a note to Great Britain and Italy demanding consideration on the same basis as other countries. "To place before Russia decisions already adopted without her participation," says the note, "would simply force Russia not to recognize these decisions."

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
