The Prince Edward Island hard-shell clam harvest for 1909 promises to reach 12,000 bushels. Nearly all of these clams find their way to New York. The time for gathering them is the months of May, June and September, and those caught in the latter months are always of superior quality. Motor boats are used by the fishermen, and September prices range from \$1.50 to \$1.80 per bag, containing one and a half bushels. These are the clams that the eagle gets in New York when he calls for a "dozen little necks on the half shell." Little Neck Bay at the western end of Long Island, from which tons of these shell fish have been taken in years gone by and from which they derive their name, doesn't produce enough clams to furnish a first-class hotel a month, consequently it is a good thing that Prince Edward Island to some extent meets the demand from the American metropolis.—Portland Argus.
