—COMMUNITY CLUB ORGANIZED AT NORTH BEDEQUE.—In connection with the Thanksgiving-Armistice week, at a public meeting held in the N. Bedeque Community Hall, and addressed by Hon. A. E. BRITISH TROOPS ROUT RAIDERS IN HOLY LAND

JERUSALEM, Nov. 18.—A renewal or recent disorders in Palestine resulted in a two-hour pitched battle between British troops and a band of raiders at Safad last night. One soldier was seriously wounded. The casualties among the attacking band were not known. The attack was well organized, officials reported. Reinforcements summoned from the neighboring colony of Roshpina aided in routing the attacking force. Several armored cars were used. Safad was the scene of severe fighting during the Arab-Jewish riots. Last night's outbreak was the first serious incident since the disorders were halted by British troops after heavy loss of life throughout Palestine. Isolated attacks have been reported almost daily but they usually were instigated by small groups of bandits or tribesmen who raided colonists in the fields.

DIPLOMATIC VICTORY

LONDON, Nov. 18.—The appointment of Sir Ronald Lindsay, permanent under-secretary of state for foreign affairs, as Britain's new ambassador to Washington, and the appointment of Sir Esmond Ovey to Soviet Russia, who was supposed to go to Brazil, tells an interesting story of the difficulties of labor, which ended in a victory for the foreign office. It is understood that Rt. Hon. Arthur Henderson, secretary of state for foreign affairs, wanted a Labor politician appointed as British official representative in Russia, but Premier Ramsay MacDonald decided in favor of the foreign office suggestion that official diplomats should be appointed.

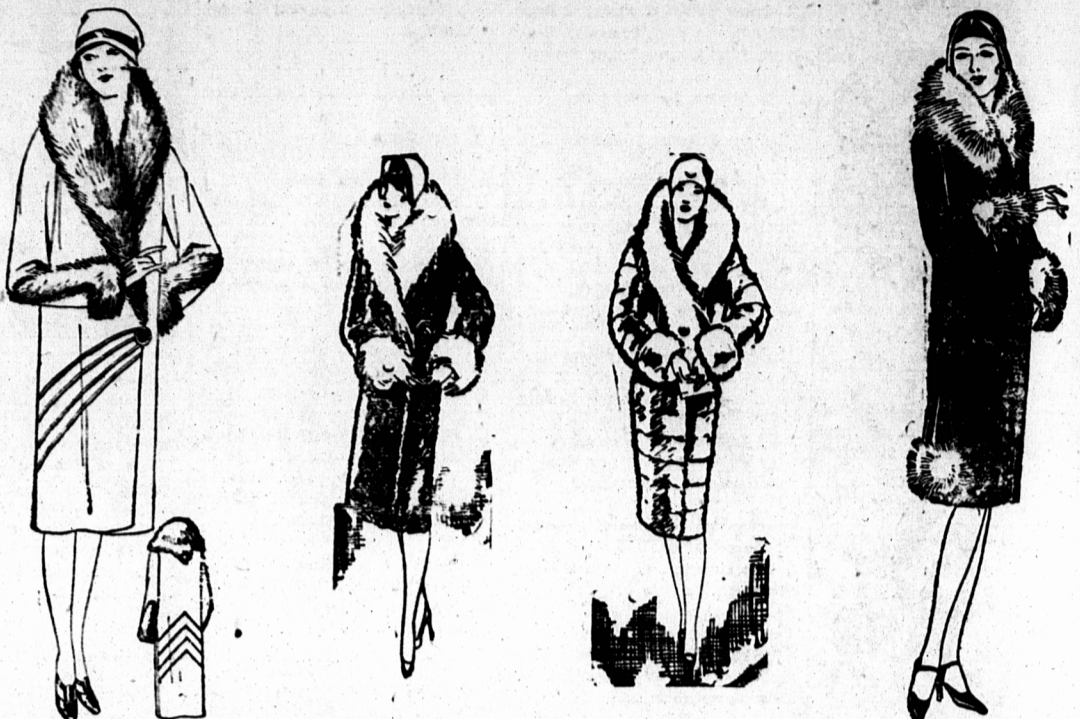
