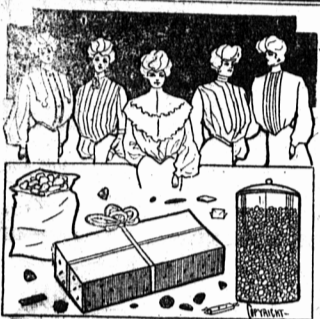

HON. H. R. EMMERSON OPENED WINTER FAIR

Show at Amherst this Year is Better Than Last One, and Exhibits are Much Improved. Annual Banquet Held in the Evening, with Many Notables Present.

Ideal weather greeted the managers of the Maritime Winter Fair at Amherst Monday when the doors were thrown open to the public at 1 o'clock.

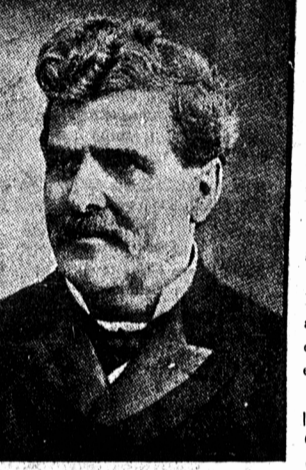
A decided improvement is noted over last year in nearly every department, showing that the farmers of the maritime provinces are taking a keen interest in the exhibition. The Women's Hospital Aid are providing meals at all hours in the building.

In the beef department the number and quality are both ahead of last year. Both the sheep and hogs are ahead of any previous year. The exhibit of poultry is not so large as last season but the selections are of a much better quality, the buff orpington, buff barred and white rocks, and span dots predominate in the henery exhibit and are equal to, if not better, than last year.

The annual banquet of the commissioners was held from 6 to 8. After partaking of a splendid dinner President Elderkin proposed the following toasts: The King,

In opening he read messages of regret from Hon. Messrs. Fielding Borden and Murray, who were unable to be present. He said that Hon. Sydney Fisher, who is expected, had not arrived but would probably be here later. Mayer Rhodes and H. P. Logan, M. P., gave addresses of welcome.

In the absence of Mr. Fisher, Hon. H. R. Emerson was called upon and in a short but appropriate address declared the exhibition open. Other speakers were Prof. F. W. Hodson, Dominion stock commissioner; Prof. C. C. James, deputy minister of agriculture, Ontario; Prof. Cummings, the president of the Nova Scotia agricultural school and Rev. Father Burke of P. E. Island.

The speakers were unanimous in their expressions of the success of the fair, emphasizing the benefits that were being derived from the annual exhibits, especially from the educational standpoint. They spoke in the very highest terms of the management and especially of Capt. Elderkin, the president, for his splendid work. The attendance was hardly as large as on the opening day last year.

INTERVIEWING OF AD'ML. ALEXIEFF

PARIS, Dec. 13—Some of the correspondents of the Paris Newspapers have attempted to interview Admiral Alexieff in St. Petersburg, but failed to do so. They have been obliged to content themselves with what the Admiral's friends thought proper to tell them, and it is hardly necessary to say that they gave a highly favorable account of him. Admiral Alexieff will, however, want as good deal of defending to exculpate him from the reproach of having contributed to bring about the war with Japan. The comments he is believed to have invariably sent to St. Petersburg with Baron Roman's despatches from Tokyo, which passed through his hands, would alone tender his responsibility a grave one. It is not as yet known to what extent he disagreed with General Kuropatkin. But there is a widespread impression that they did not work harmoniously together, and in Russia public opinion is on the side of General Kuropatkin.

The Admiral's friends consulted by the French correspondents think differently. Their defence consists to a great extent of a flat denial of the charge against the Viceroy. The most important of these statements is that communicated by M. Dru, of the Echo de Paris, who says in the course of his introductory remarks that is anticipating a revival of his influence the Viceroy fails to reckon by the Russian public opinion which will no longer hear of him. According to the statement made to Mr. Dru, Admiral Alexieff had from the first predicted that war was inevitable if Russia did not maintain in the Far East naval and military forces almost equal to those of Japan. In view of the formidable Japanese preparations in 1903, he repeatedly demanded men, guns, and ships. He warned the Government against the delusion that a mission in Korea would satisfy Japan, but in spite of his repeated warnings the authorities in St. Petersburg contented themselves with saying that the Tsar was opposed to the war, which was consequently impossible. The Viceroy treats with contemptuous silence the autonomy that he promoted the war in the interest of the Bezaroff enterprises in Korea. Japan was ready for war in 1900, before there was any talk of M. Bezoroff. The motive of the conflict was racial hatred, and the opposition between the extensive tendencies of the two Empires. The charge that the surprise of the Russian ships on February was due to the Viceroy's alleged lack of foresight is met by the statement that he was immediately informed from St. Petersburg that the recall of the Japanese Minister did not mean war. Then follows a denial in detail of the accusation that Admiral Alexieff had interfered with General Kuropatkin's plans.

A similar line was taken by another of the Admiral's friends in conversation with M. Lagandara, of the Petit Parisien. The former stated that the Viceroy's defence of his action is supported by numerous documents, including reports of interviews between himself and General Kuropatkin.
