Scottish Labor Members Suspended From Commons

LONDON, June 27.—Three Scottish labor members James Maxton, J. Wheatley and Rev. Campbell Steven were suspended from the House of Commons this evening after a stormy session over a proposed reduction in the appropriations for child welfare in Scotland.

LONDON, June 27.—Maxton and Wheatley denounced those favoring the reduction, notably George Banbury, a Labor member for Poplar as "murderers" and refused to withdraw, despite the advice of J. Ramsay MacDonald, Labor leader.

They also refused the summons to leave, whereupon they were formally named by the speaker and the Home Secretary moved their suspension, which was carried two fifty eight to seventy.

Rev. Mr. Steven arose and repeated that Mr. Banbury was a "murderer" and refused to withdraw. He was named by the speaker and suspended by a vote of two fifty six to fifty.

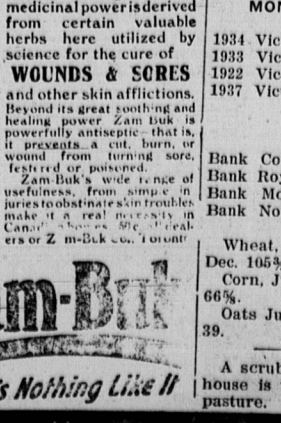
Hardly had the hubbub subsided when another Scotchman, G. Buchanan got into trouble. Emanuel Shinwell was commenting on the demeanor of the ministerialists understood to have made immediate references to a Jew with regard to Shinwell.

This latter resented although he said he was proud of being a Jew. Immediately a clamor arose on the Labor benches for the suspension of the offender. Buchanan roared "white livered cowards" while the chairman J. F. Hope said he had not heard an offensive remark. Buchanan continued shouting, accusing the Chair of partiality.

He refused to take his seat and was suspended two eighty six to fifty eight. Sir George Hamilton eventually apologized to Mr. Shinwell and quiet was restored.

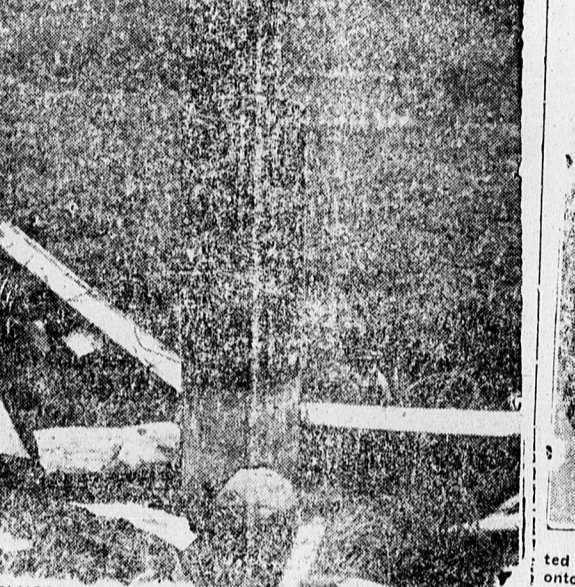


TERRIBLE CONDITIONS PREVAIL IN NEW YORK

The Sizzling Heat Responsible for Many Tragedies and Develops into an Electrical Storm Causing Further Deaths and Disaster.

NEW YORK, June 27.—One woman was killed and several persons injured late today when a violent wind, electrical and hail storm of only ten minutes duration swept over the Buswick and East New York section of Brooklyn. The woman, Miss Bertha Vall, was killed when the wind toppled a thirty-foot brick wall, demolishing an automobile in which she was seated with Mrs. Rose Herring and Mrs. Herring's divorced husband, David Rosenfeld. Mrs. Herring was expected to die, and Rosenfeld was badly hurt.

Fifty of the finest trees in Prospect Park were felled, some of them more than a hundred years old. The storm was the climax of a sizzling day fraught with tragedy. Mrs. Emily Elsworth died of heart failure, super-induced by heat. Unbalanced by the heat, Mrs. Doris Katz, mother of three children, leaped six stories from her apartment and was killed.

DISEASES LIVE IN DEAD WOOD

Many diseases of fruit and ornamental trees pass the winter in cankers on the branches which, if not removed and destroyed, become fruitful sources for the spread of the disease.

The diseased prunings must be burned, advises the Ohio Experimental Station, for if left on the ground spores will develop and still further spread the disease.

It is usually best to remove these which have become so badly infected that it is impossible to check the progress of the disease.

Diseases and insect pests are harbored in rubbish of various kinds which should not be allowed to accumulate for sanitary reasons as well as for the sake of appearance.

CARRYING INFECTION TO THE COW'S UDDER

We are asked many questions relative to udder and teat troubles in cows. In treating such cases there is great danger of infection from unclean hands, and in using milking tubes or syphons or teat plugs that have not been previously sterilized.

To sterilize a milking tube, first clear the blind end by use of a wire and see that no solid matter is left adhering to any part of the tube which should also be perfectly smooth. Then place the tube in a kettle or other receptacle of water and boil it for at least 15 minutes before and after use.

Before inserting it in the teat also apply a little carbonized vaseline to the tube, which meanwhile should have been carried in a cup containing a 5 per cent. solution of carbolic acid or some alcohol. Before inserting even a sterilized milking tube in a teat it is well to immerse the teat for 5 minutes or more in hot water containing all the boric acid it will dissolve, or in a warm 1 to 100 solution of chinosol. After using the tube it should again be cleaned and sterilized and then placed in a bottle containing the disinfecting solution or some alcohol. The same care should be taken as regards all teat "plugs," dilators, bistouries, or slitters, and all knives or other instruments used for operations on animals or man should be as carefully sterilized.—J. A. B.
