M. LLOYD GEORGE AND MA. CHURCHILL AS ORATORS

hour of premeditation which he gives to them that their full value is only to be measured by one who takes time to review the spacious argument.

Now, since Mr. Churchill relies on preparation, he is not so ready in debate as the Chancellor, nor has he the same keen eye for the via media between conflicting claims. This has often been remarked by observers in the House of Commons, where nearly every speech, delivered by a Minister during the committee stage of a Bill is unprepared.

Amendments springing upon him on the spur of the moment, and the minister in charge of the Bill must improvise his argument in reply as he goes along. In this Mr. Lloyd George excels by his fertility, and by quickly adapting his tone and phrasing to the needs of the moment. I remember an evening a year or two ago in the House of Commons when, after a fast and furious debate in which Mr. Lloyd George had played a prominent part, the atmosphere cooled, and Mr. Balfour said: "The right hon. gentleman is now in his conciliatory mood, and in no mood to be more dangerous!" It was a shrewd remark, for, great as is the Chancellor's power of rounding his friends, his other power of soothing and coaxing his opponents to make them yield a point is really more remarkable. At such times he is the very embodiment of fascinating urbane. Mr. Churchill does not possess this quick adaptability, and, lacking it, he cannot take rank with the greatest parliamentarians.

The power of timely conciliatory argument, which Mr. Lloyd George, Mr. Balfour, and Sir John Simon possess to a marked degree, is essential to the highest success in the House of Commons.

FOOTBALL CASUALTIES

CHICAGO, Nov. 22—Fourteen players were killed and 175 were injured in a foot ball game in the season which virtually closed today. This record of casualties is only slightly below that of 1912 when thirteen players met death and 183 were injured.

These figures were compiled from press reports and published here today. The injured include only those who suffered broken bones, severe strains, and sprains, and internal injuries.

Of the fourteen deaths, thirteen succumbed to injuries occurring this year. Charles Sweetzer, formerly a Hamilton University player, died November 17 in St. Paul, following a complication of diseases resulting from injuries several years ago. Other fatalities resulted with exceptions, from fractured skulls, broken necks or spinal injuries.

FOOTBALL

The third game of football between the Ounnaught Club and St. Dunstan's College, which was played at Victoria Park on Monday afternoon in the presence of a large number of spectators, resulted, after an interesting and exciting game, in a point-less draw. The play was of the best standard seen so far this season and was of a give and take character. In the first half the Ounnaught, had the better of the play, while in the second moiety the advantage went the way of the College men. Of the three games now played between these teams, the College has the best of matters, having won the only game in which there was a decisive result, the other two being both draws.

The St. Dunstan's College football team has arranged to play the M.C. Macs footballers tomorrow afternoon. The game will be played at the college grounds, and the championship will be a game with it. On account of three of the Abegweit Club being abroad it is reported that a decision was arrived at that the Club could not put a team on the field to defend the championship on Thursday. As a consequence, on invitation, the College has jumped into the breach to give the Indians a game. St. Dunstan's will play without Park, the crack halfback, so that an interesting game may be expected.

As the football season has arrived, in fact is almost at an end, one wonders who holds the championship. There seems to be a good deal of dis-

pute as to that. A College supporter presents the College side as follows:—St. Dunstan's College has this season played brilliant ball against home and foreign clubs. The team has not been scored against yet but on the contrary has inflicted a double defeat on their opponents. One wonders why the Abbies have not put a fifteen on the gridiron this autumn. It is reported that the Collegians do not entertain even a thought of playing the Abbies for the championship. It seems that some explanation is due for this extraordinary stand. Will some one kindly explain?

The other side of the question is represented by the following statement by an official of the A. A. A. A. last night:—"The Abegweit football team, champions of Prince Edward Island, are ready to defend that title against any team claiming the same. Place and date to be arranged."
