Effect of Budget on Excess Profits & Corporations

OTTAWA, June 29 — Discussion of excess profits and corporation taxes in his budget speech, Finance Minister Halsey said: "We cannot shut our eyes to the fact that with the change from war to peace many firms may encounter temporary losses and under our present practice, taxes paid over the whole period of war and re-adjustment may bear considerably higher rates to the full realized income than those prescribed by law."

"I am particularly concerned lest for this reason, when the time comes to replace war industries with peace industries, business enterprises should be handicapped in making the necessary changes or should be hesitant rather than prompt in action."

The multiple change in line with this statement is the allowing a business firm to charge a loss in any one year back to profits in the previous year or forward for three years.

Thus if a firm made a profit of \$100,000 in 1945 on part of which it paid a tax of \$20,000. Or if it had a profit of \$200,000 each in the years 1947, 1948 and 1949, it could spread its \$40,000 loss over those three years and have no taxable profits at all in those years.

Because of shortage of labor and materials some firms have been unable to carry on normal maintenance and repair of their plants and equipment. The budget proposes that half the expense on maintenance and repair in a period to be fixed may be charged back to fiscal periods ending not earlier than 1943.

More generous allowances for research and development are also designed to facilitate expansion after the war. On the basis that the present excess profits tax law discourages new enterprise and that it is desirable to give business some assurance on the rate of taxation for the future the Minister proposed that, in respect of new investment in depreciable assets, the depreciation be allowed a variable rate of investment.

The proposal, he said, would allow a taxpayer to recover part of his investment when earnings were good and still preserve his profit over the life of the investment and also transfer some of the income from the period when war tax rates are in effect to a later period.
