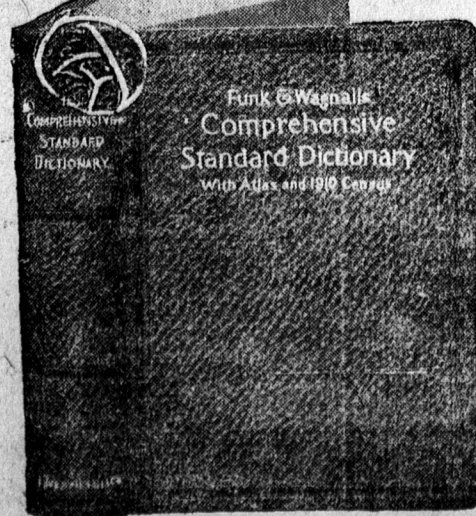

### THIS CANADIAN BOY PILED UP A FORTUNE

Ovide Colombe Was Known in the Klondike as "Blowback"—Has a History

A young French-Canadian, Ovide Colombe of Spokane, Wash., and Calgary, Alberta, who is familiarly known in the West as "Blowback," has an interesting history. In 1896 when he was but 14 years old, he ran away from his home in Quebec City and landed at Vancouver, B.C., where he joined a party that went up into the Klondike. He remained in Dawson City about two years before he was joined by a small-sized fortune, which he lost in a very short time in Seattle. Blowback was game, however, as he went back into the "old country" again, traveling over three thousand miles by dog train, and young as he was he established a freighting business, handling generally about thirty dogs, which were worth anywhere from \$150 to \$300 each. He made money rapidly, and at the expiration of four years' time hauling freight with his dog teams, he came out with a hundred thousand dollars. This he retained, investing nearly all of it in Spokane, and Calgary.

### ONTARIO FOX FARMER

Twenty years ago, Mr. L. L. Borrowman of Wyoming first conceived the idea of raising silver grey foxes. In his business as a fur dealer he saw the possibilities in breeding fur-bearing animals and after long thought he finally secured, at great expense, two pairs of "silver-greys," which had been dug out of their den when they were puppies. The history of Mr. Borrowman's success is a story of pluck and perseverance. "I spent thousands of dollars," said Mr. Borrowman, "before I achieved results. Twelve years passed before I came upon the secret of successful fox raising and during all that time my neighbors laughed at me, said I was a fool with more money than brains, and other things, not of a complimentary nature. Now they no longer make remarks of this kind."

Mr. Borrowman, in placing too many foxes together, I used to have two pairs in 'the same pen.' The females are very jealous of each other and if given a chance will destroy their young. In order to conceal the little ones, the mother foxes bury them in the ground. They do this with the best of intentions but of course the puppies smother. The first year I tried putting each pair by themselves. I got nine puppies and I have been raising them ever since." At the time when Mr. Borrowman's stock consisted of three pairs of foxes a Wyoming paper stated that his farm had netted him at the close of the season, ten thousand dollars in cash. Mr. Borrowman's stock now consists of ten pairs of foxes and at the present times foxes which formerly sold for \$1,000 now bring from seven to ten thousand dollars. At these advanced prices, it can readily be seen, that Mr. Borrowman's farm represents a large amount of money.

### OLD MARRIAGE RECORDS

Conducted in Prince Edward County From 1802 to 1823

Some seventy-six manuscript records of marriages conducted in the county of Prince Edward from 1802 to 1823 were received by Deputy Registrar-General of Ontario. The marriages were conducted by Stephen Conger, who was sworn in as the office of Registrar-General at Kingston on July 12, 1803, and in his own handwriting the records are engrossed. Among the number many well known names in the country are found, one of which is the record of the marriage of Richard G. Clute and Sarah Ann Goldsmith, under license from his Excellency, Francis Gore, Lieutenant-Governor of Upper Canada, dated March 8, 1810. The marriage was solemnized on the 12th of the same month. Compulsory registration of marriages with the Registrar-General was not known then. These records were in the possession of the widow of the late Nelson Conger, 221 Major street, Toronto, and were secured for the department through the instrumentality of Mr. Geo. A. Kingston, K.C., whose wife is a great-granddaughter of Stephen Conger.
