HABEAS CORPUS CASE NEW YORK, March 28.-Supreme court justice Newburger today dismissed the writ of habeas corpus issue in the behalf of John B. Lang, a ticket speculator, arrested in a test case in the ordinance passed by the board of aldermen against the sale of tickets in front of theaters, and remanded the prisoner. The justice says 'it must be held that the ordinance complained of was within the power of the board of aldermen and that the arrest by the police was justified.'
