In this way it would clear up many of the mysteries of estimates on Government spending before the Legislature reached the floor of the Commons.

Mr. Abbott had the last word in the discussion. He said the Government would study the role of the committee made by the various members.

At the outset of financial discussions, Mr. Abbott said that the Government will announce before the end of the current session a grant-in-aid-of-taxation plan for Federal properties in municipalities across Canada.

The Federal Government owns considerable land in municipalities. Since the land is owned and taxed there are various methods by which the Government reimburses the municipalities for their taxation losses.

"But in society as we know it today, social insurance must go beyond the kind of insurance which a premium is paid to provide against a risk which is likely to occur. In addition, to meeting the hazards of unemployment, sickness and old age, we must seek to give to as many of our people as possible the opportunity to develop their talents and make their individual lives a success.

But there is a danger which we must avoid just as enterprises suffer when men of substance go too far in trying to secure their fortunes and their capital from risk, so will the community suffer if social insurance is provided to the point where it weakens the incentive to produce.

What is not easy to say exactly is that it is not yet reached the point in Canada where we can say our social insurance is too good. But I would remind you that the great social advances of recent times have been paid for in a sum total of goods and services we have produced here in Canada.

Mr. St. Laurent declared that if free enterprise is to endure, the majority of the people in a free country must be satisfied, and must continue to be satisfied, that it is the best available means of giving them a fair share of the good things of life.

Expressing his hope that free enterprise and social security are not opposed to each other, he added that if they were, he was confident that "when people generally have to choose which they prefer, the majority will choose

Canada's Export Sales To The U.S. Are Lagging

OTTAWA, Oct. 26—(CP)—Canada is lagging behind this year in her drive to sell more to the United States.

Exports to the U.S. for the first nine months of the year have been \$1,224,500,000, \$16,000,000 lower in the same period of 1948, the Bureau of Statistics reported today.

Exports of gold were not included in the Bureau's report. Imports figures were not given.

Total export trade fell nine per cent during the month to \$228,400,000 from \$251,700,000 in August and was 29 per cent lower than the usually high total for September, 1948, when exports were boosted by removal of an export ban on cattle.

Big cuts in exports of cattle, meat, lumber and newsprint pulled down the export total.

Sales to the U.S. were \$113,700,000, a drop from \$115,400,000 in August.

Canada's total exports for the first nine months of 1949 have been \$1,246,000,000, about \$14,000,000 lower than in the same period last year.

Sales to the United Kingdom were about \$11,000,000 higher during September. They totalled \$56,200,000 and for the first nine months of the year have been \$335,800,000, compared with \$323,800,000 for the same period last year.

Total sales to Commonwealth countries during the month were \$77,700,000 compared with \$75,800,000 in September last year.

Latin America bought \$8,708,000 worth of Canadian products, a drop from the \$10,946,000 of September last year and the cumulative total for the year to date is \$42,540,000 in 1949 and \$48,085,000 in 1948.

One of the biggest items of the miscellaneous group, ships and boats, fell from \$12,100,000 in 1948 to \$11,700,000 in 1949.

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Expect Diesels For C. N. R. Here Early Next Year

MONTREAL, Oct. 26—(CP)—Canadian National Railways officials said today that completion of plans to convert the Prince Edward Island division from steam locomotives depends upon delivery date of the machines and that is expected early next year.

The plan calls for use of 18 diesel locomotives in the Island and the C.N.R. has had its ups and downs in fulfilling these.

The principle of conversion was announced more than a year ago and 18 diesels were ordered from a Canadian firm. The first machines proved unsuitable and were sent back for modifications.

When these in turn were found unsuitable the order was cancelled and another placed.

Now, an official said, the new diesels are expected to be delivered in January or February.

"Never had any doubt about it," Cohn said jovially. "I made a deal with myself when I was 99 to live till I was 100."
