CONSTRUCTION PROGRESS

Construction of the \$45,000 rink being erected by the Summerside Curling Club is progressing rapidly and it is expected that it will be completed and ready for operation by the middle of November. The cement block walls, which are now being erected are expected to be completed along with the roofing within the next two weeks if the weather is favourable. The structure, which is situated on Notre Dame Street, will be approximately fifty by one hundred and sixty-five feet and will have three rinks with provision for artificial ice.

DEATH AT BEDEQUE

The death of Mr. John S. Jack, Bedeque, occurred in the Prince County Hospital on September 2 at the age of eighty-four years. The deceased, who was born in North Rustico in 1864, lived in Bedeque for over sixty years and for the past year at the home of his son, Stanley. His wife predeceased him nine years ago. There are left to cherish his memory his six sons, William, James, Edward and Robert in Massachusetts, Lewis in Ontario and Stanley in Bedeque. A short service was held on Monday afternoon at the home previous to the funeral service in Bedeque United Church. Rev. B. Crowe, B.A., officiated. "The Lord's My Shepherd," "Unto the Hills" and "Rock of Ages" were the hymns sung. The pallbearers were Messrs. Orville Johnston, Walter Brown, Earl Inman, Owen Connolly, Angus MacDonald, Lloyd Affleck. Interment was in the family plot in the Lower Bedeque Cemetery.

Fire Destroys Dwelling At St. Eleanors

A dwelling house owned by Mr. Hiram Thompson was destroyed by fire last evening at St. Eleanors. The fire apparently started near the flue and when discovered was breaking through the roof. Even then the buildings might have been saved except that there was no supply of water near. A crowd gathered and had plenty of time to save all the downstairs furniture, all of the doors and even the window sashes. The house was located near a grove of trees but unfortunately the wind there was blowing in the opposite direction and also away from the other buildings. Mr. Thompson raises chickens extensively and at the time the fire broke out he and Mrs. Thompson and the children were in the chicken barn some distance away. The fire was first seen by some neighbors. The loss is partly covered by insurance. The blaze was discovered about 6:30 and someone called in an alarm to Summerside. The siren sounded but although the firemen gathered at the fire station no equipment moved out as the fire was outside the limits of the Town. Members of Summerside detachment, R.C.M.P., were on hand and gave assistance. It is reported that only a few chicks were saved from the number of chickens stolen from one of his barns.

Isley Joins Royal Bank



Appointment of the Rt. Hon. J. L. Isley, F. C. K.C., as a Director of The Royal Bank of Canada is announced today. Finance Minister for the Dominion throughout the war years Mr. Isley will bring to the councils of The Royal Bank of Canada one of the keenest, most practical and legal minds in the country. It was on Mr. Isley's shoulders that the onerous duty of organizing Canada's wartime financial structure fell in July, 1940 when he became Minister of Finance in Canada's wartime Cabinet. Mobilization of the financial resources of the country for a supreme war effort, and direction of national policy in the field of finance throughout the war years became his responsibility. Organization of succeeding Victory Loan Campaigns, the control of inflation and the diversion of the nation's financial resources to war production, all came under his jurisdiction in 1940 and again in 1946 on the latter occasion as member of the newly created district of Digby-Annapolis-Kings. He was sworn in the Privy Council and appointed Minister of National Revenue in the third Government of the Rt. Hon. W. L. M. King in 1935.
