WIRED NEWS OF HIS OWN DEATH.

SPRINGFIELD, MASS., Feb. 16.—Charles H. Wattell of this city committed suicide to-day by drinking laudanum. He telegraphed in his wife's name, to his sister, Mrs. Lou S. Wayne of Albany, N. Y., announcing his death, six hours before it took place. The sister arrived about midnight, and saw Wattell before he died at the hospital.

SWEPT INTO THE GULCH.

MISOULA, MONT., Feb. 16.—A snow-slide has occurred at the "S" Bridge, on the Northern Pacific Railroad, between Mullan and Dorsey, destroying seven bands of the trestlework, and sweeping a freight train into the gulch, many feet below. Every member of the freight crew was injured, two probably fatally.

PREDICTS CIVIL WAR.

NEW YORK, Feb. 16.—While presiding over services in connection with the semi-centennial celebration of St. Paul's Methodist Church in Newark, N. J., Gov. Franklin Murphy predicted that unless in the near future greater harmony be restored between capital and labor the country will be plunged into a civil war more disastrous than any previously recorded in history.

TILLMAN APPLIES FOR BAIL

The Slayer of Editor Gonzales Pleads Self Defence.

THE CASE IS POSTPONED

A Friend of Tillman's Confirms His Version of the Shooting and Gonzales' Threats.

COLUMBIA, S. C., Feb. 14.—Chief Justice Pope will hear on Thursday next the application for bail in the case of W. H. Tillman, who killed editor Gonzales. The hearing was postponed to to-day because Tillman's attorneys failed to serve the prosecution with the affidavits which they intended to present Justice Pope. These affidavits are by Col. Tillman himself, and by a friend of his, Richard Holtzendorf of Edgefield. His affidavit is to the effect that he heard editor Gonzales inquire of Doorkespeck J. A. White where his "boss" was, that he made Tillman show the white feather several times, and would do it again. He subsequently saw the meeting between Tillman and Gonzales, and his version agrees with that of Tillman as to the circumstances of the meeting. J. A. White substantiates what Holtzendorf said as to the conversation, except that he did not know it was Gonzales who was talking to him. Tillman's affidavit says he had been abused and maligned by the editor of the State. He heard rumors that Mr. Gonzales had threatened him, and friends advised him to be on his guard. He was informed that Mr. Gonzales inquired for him at the State House, saying he would make him show the white feather. On the day of the shooting he happened to be moving some of his effects, including two pistols from the State House to his rooms. He saw Mr. Gonzales coming, glaring at him; saw him run his hand deep in his overcoat pocket and turn toward him, and believing his life in danger, he hurriedly said: "I received your message," and fired.

MACEDONIAN QUESTION THE IMPORTANT

Issue of the Hour in Diplomatic Circles.

THE BALKAN AGITATORS

Afraid the Sultan May Make Terms—Flogging Scandal in the Guards Brigade.

LONDON, February 14.—The Macedonian question remains the most important European issue. The revolutionists are making strenuous efforts to secure the condemnation of the Austro-Russian proposals of reform before the text has been submitted to the Sultan or published in any continental capital. There is an evident desire on the part of the Balkan agitators to produce an unmanageable situation, and drag first Bulgaria and Serbia, and finally Russia, into war with Turkey. The work which preceded the Russian campaign of 1877 was conducted with secrecy and subtlety, whereas the present operations are noisy, and reveal plainly the methods of the professional agitators.

VARIED OPINIONS.

Some of the closest observers are convinced that the Czar is as anxious as the Emperor of Austria-Hungary to prevent an outbreak of hostilities, and that the Russian Minister of Finance is not prepared to supply money for a decisive campaign. Lansdoff and Gutschowki (respectively the Foreign Ministers of Russia and Austria-Hungary), according to this view, have prepared a moderate scheme of reforms, which the German Emperor will strongly advise the Sultan to accept and the Macedonian agitators are apprehensive lest the Sultan may forestall their well organized movement by a prompt acquiescence in the wishes of the European powers. An early outbreak of hostilities is favored by the open weather in the Balkans, and Bulgaria and Serbia may be carried away by infectious excitement.

SCANDAL IN THE GUARDS.

The Guards scandal remains the subject of paramount interest in political, social and military circles. Rear Admiral Cochrane has not proved his charge, that Lieut-Col. Kinloch authorized the sutlers' court-martial to take the case of Lieut. Leveson-Gower and punish him, but he has strongly supported Lord Roberts' action in holding the commanding officers of battalions responsible for irregular methods in enforcing discipline in the Guards brigade. Nothing short of a general order holding Colonels of regiments responsible for inquisitions and floggings conducted by subalterns can prevent a thorough investigation of the peculiar customs of the Guards brigade. The apology of these customs offer the flimsy excuse that the regimental mess-room has borrowed and accepted the principles of public school discipline. While flogging has virtually disappeared from the criminal administration, except in exceptional instances, when incorrigible convicts are punished with the whip or the cat, the Guards brigade retains it as a means of grace for the reformation of unclubbable companions.
