STARTING TO BUSH THE ICE.—Workmen are starting today to bush the ice on the river. Owing to the mildness of the season this work has been delayed much longer than usual. A number of the creeks on the coast have already been bushed. Mr. McMillan, secretary of the Provincial Public Works Department, says he recalls only one year—in 1902—when it was necessary to delay the bushing so long. During that year the ferry boat ran from Charlottetown until Feb. 4th, and the first trip of the following season was made in March 17th.

SUPREME COURT.—The case of Boswell Carver vs. Julia Carver administratrix, and others, action on a promissory note in favor of the late Francis Forbes which the plaintiff claimed was endorsed over to him for value, was concluded before Mr. Justice Hazard and jury yesterday, when a verdict was given for the plaintiff for \$109.73. The jury divided 5 to 2 on the verdict. Messrs. Martin K. C., and Donald MacKinnon, K. C. appeared for plaintiff and Messrs D. A. MacKinnon, K. C., and McNeill for defendant. In the case of Murdoch McLean vs. M. H. Campbell, absent debtor, judgment for \$126.75 was given for plaintiff. The Court adjourned until Feb. 18th for the trial of the case of the Bank of Montreal vs. Patons Ltd., and for the hearing of an argument in the case of Lecky and another vs. Calbeck.
