George Smith, Hunter River Remanded to Jail for Preliminary Hearing In Connection With Death Of Mrs. John Darrach In Motor Accident Saturday.

A charge of manslaughter has been laid against George Smith of Hunter River, driver of the car that killed Mrs. John Darrach, 65, on the road at Brookfield Saturday morning. Smith has been remanded to Queens County Jail pending the preliminary hearing on Tuesday, at 2 p. m., which is to take place before Magistrate G. J. Tweedy.

George Smith (sworn) stated that he lives at Hunter River, is 24 years of age, and was driving the car that struck the deceased. The car, witness said, is registered at New Hamp hire, but he had been living at home since August. He left home at 8 o'clock on Saturday morning in McNeill's car, but had a flat tire about a quarter of a mile from Brookfield. Witness went back for his own car, picked up McNeill and proceeded in the direction of the City. As the sun was shining in his eyes witness had trouble in seeing distinctly he said. He

Einstein Will Pursue His Research Work In U.S.

Noted German Scientist To Spend Three Months At Western Observatory—Plans Are Kept Secret.

BERLIN, Nov. 16—Prof. Albert Einstein, Universe Maker, is planning to leave soon for the United States where he has accepted an invitation to spend three months in special research work at a western observatory.

The fact that his fame has become so great as the result of his startling theories has caused him to envelop his plans for the transoceanic voyage in secrecy. Not until last night was the United Press able to establish definitely his intention to sail.

Einstein will be accompanied by his wife, an assistant named Dr. Meyer and a woman secretary. All have been cautioned not to divulge details of the trip and the party will travel under assumed names.

The invitation to the United States was believed to have been extended by an American scientific body although Einstein likewise desired not to have this fact disclosed.

Britain Keeps Faith With Jews

LONDON, Nov. 16—Prime Minister MacDonald told David Lloyd George the Liberal leader today that the Government plans to submit its Palestine policy for discussion in the House of Commons soon, probably Monday. He said the Government planned to fulfill all its obligations in Palestine and that the recent protests of Jewish and Arab leaders against the declaration of policy was due to a misunderstanding and misinterpretation of the white paper.

Aid from Liberals again enabled the Laborite Government to escape defeat in the House of Commons last night. A majority of the Liberal members abstained from voting and enabled the passage of a Government resolution regarding the school age bill by a vote of 271 to 243.
