OBITUARY.

The death occurred on Saturday, March 9th, 1912, of Price Inman, eldest son of Peter and Emily Inman of Argyle Shore, P.E.I., aged fifteen years. He enjoyed the benefit of a liberal and religious education, and was a youth of great promise, amiable manners and exemplary piety. His friends had observed with grief, the progress of the fatal disease, (spinal meningitis), which brought him to an early tomb; and he himself was not unaware of the probable result. He was always tranquil, fearless and happy. His youth, his prospects, as he intended taking a college course, and his connections, were such as to render it desirable for him to live. Nevertheless the last enemy was entirely beneath his feet, and all was quietness and assurance. Now his joy is full. "Absent from the body and present with the Lord." His mortal remains were interred in the Hampton Cemetery. The service was conducted by his pastor, Rev. W. M. Field, assisted by Rev. Jas. McDougall. The procession was very large. Much sympathy is extended to the bereaved family upon the loss of so devoted a son.

STOCK NOTE.
