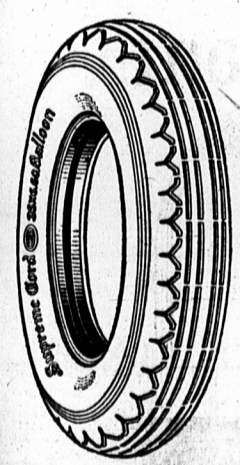

As a result of the extensive advertising campaign which has been and at the present time is being carried on by the Canadian National Railways throughout the United States and Canada, along with the efforts of the various Tourist Associations and Publicity Bureaux, it is expected that a large number of tourists will visit the Maritime Provinces during the coming season, which will tax the combined hotel and resort facilities to their utmost. But there would appear to be an almost unexploited field of opportunity as regards farm houses and private homes of the Province in which vacationists would be welcomed as paying guests, that may, with advantage, be opened up, and which will bring in visitors who, for some reason or another, are not attracted to hotel and resort accommodation. It is essential of course, that such places be equipped with reasonable sanitary conveniences. To have available a reserve of tourist accommodation, and to provide for this class of visitor, your co-operation is asked and any of those who may be desirous of accommodating paying guests this season are requested to send in to the General Passenger Department of the Canadian National Railways at Moncton, N. B., their names, with Post Office address and information as to rates per day and per week, number of persons that can be accommodated, distance from railway station and mode of conveyance from and to railway station with rates charged therefor, whether room and meals or room only can be furnished, and particulars as to any exceptionally attractive features in the district, such as boating, bathing, fishing, golf or tennis and the like. BUOYS BEING LAID.—The C. G. S. Brant has been busy since last Friday laying the smaller navigation buoys along the south shore of the island. Already the buoys have been placed in Charlottetown Harbor and off Pictou and the gas light put in position off Cape Tormentine. The Brant is now on her way to lay a temporary conical buoy, for the use of the Car-ferry, off Tormentine, and another off Crapaud. She will then proceed to Georgetown, Murray Harbor and Cardigan, to place the buoys in position there. The larger buoys will be placed as soon as the conditions affecting navigation, especially ice, warrant the sailing on this duty of a larger steamer, in all probability the Aranmore.

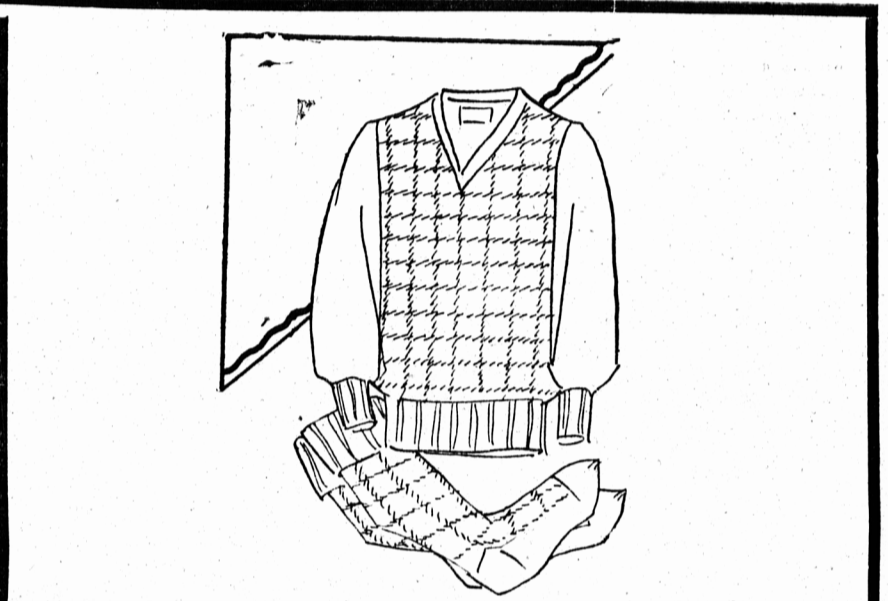
