ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

Red Rose tea is British grown. Y. M. L. A. of St. James church will meet this evening in St. James Hall at 7.30.

DURING the terrific gale on Tuesday night, the schooner Thistle, Capt McAdam bound from P. E. Island, with a cargo of hay and oats for Sydney, went ashore at New Campbellton. Crew are safe, and it is hoped that the vessel may be floated without serious damage.

Today we chronicle the death of Joseph Bell, at the advanced age of four score and one years. The deceased was born in Hull, Yorkshire, England, and came to this country with his father in 1842. They settled in Covehead, and on the death of his father Mr. Bell came to Charlottetown, where he worked at his trade of tailoring, which he had learned in the Old Country. When the market was situated where the Bank of Nova now stands Mr. Bell was market clerk. He was a thoroughly honest industrious man who exemplified in his daily walk and conversation the consistent Christian. His illness was brief, lasting only one month; previous to that he had always enjoyed remarkably good health. Death in his case was simply due to old age, and not to any particular illness. A widow and a family of eight, four sons and four daughters, survive to mourn their loss. The sons are: George, J. H., Charles and Joseph in Charlottetown; daughters, Mrs. Richard Jewell, Mrs. Wm. Henry, Mrs. Geo. Snelgrove and Mrs. F. Musick, also of this city. To the bereaved the Guardian extends its sincere sympathy.

FATIGUE SUITS FOR CAVALRY.

OTTAWA, October 28.—An annual partial issue of the blue canvas fatigue suits to N. C. O's. and men of the Royal Canadian Regiment has been authorized. Officers commanding companies of regiments will requisition for an issue equivalent to 75 per cent. of the total strength of the N.C. O's. and men under their command.

ONE FOR YARMOUTH.

OTTAWA, Oct. 27.—One of the new street light ships which the Dominion is contracting for, will be located off Yarmouth and the other near Antigonish.

IRISH MEMBERS QUIET.

LONDON, Oct. 28.—Having gained their end in forcing the discussion of coercion, the Nationalist members of the house of commons appear to have abandoned any further parliament campaign pending the return of John Redmond, the Irish leader in the house, from the United States.

W, SAYS BERESFORD.

LONDON, Oct. 28.—In a speech delivered tonight at West Bromwich, Staffordshire Vice-Admiral Lord Charles Beresford, M. P., expressed the belief that Great Britain was entering upon a century of peace.

He advocated a closer union between Great Britain and the United States, and declared that the International Mercantile Marine Company was not a monopoly, and that it would prove more favorable to England than to America.

KITCHENER IN PARIS.

PARIS, Oct. 27.—Lord Kitchener's short visit to Paris invoked anything but an unfriendly reception. He was greeted with as much hospitality by "the upper London" as the Boer Generals evoked among the masses. The visitors' books at the British Embassy were filled with the names of people who wished to pay their respects to the General and the stewards of the Jockey Club gave him a Commemorative receipt on his visit to the charity track.
