## LOCAL BRIEFS

### Latest News of the City and Province.

THE sacrament of the Lord's Supper was dispensed yesterday in Zion and St. James' Church.

THE social at Hunter River on Friday evening received a large attendance. After the carrying out of a good program the pies were auctioned by Mr. F. H. Horne. \$60 was realized.

AN Ottawa despatch of the 9th says: Premier Ferguson, Attorney-General D. A. McKinnon and Hon. B. Rogers of the Prince Edward Island government arrived here to-day.

THE Council of the Board of Trade will meet this morning at 10 o'clock in the Y. M. C. A. Among the items of business to be transacted will be the consideration of an offer of a room in the Y. M. C. A. building.

REV. G. M. CAMPBELL, president of the New Brunswick and P. E. I. conference is in the city and will preach in the Exmouth street church Sunday morning. Mr. C. H. Paisley will be here in the evening.—St. John Telegraph, Feb. 9th.

JOHNY NILSSON, the champion short distance speed skater, will soon be on the retired list. On Saturday, just after he had won the second of the three races with Norval Baptie, he said: "Well, I think I'll give up the game next year. I have been a champion now for five years. That's a pretty good record. Next year I'll give up speed competitions and go in for fancy skating exhibitions entirely."

THE regular fortnightly meeting of the Charlottetown Teachers' Association was held on Saturday evening in the Y. M. C. A. parlour. President Landigan presided. The discussion was passed upon Landon's school management. The subject under consideration was discipline. Many useful hints were given as to the best method of influencing children. The discussion was animated and helpful to the teachers present.

IN accordance with a letter received from the Administrator of the Diocese the services at St. Peter's Church yesterday had special reference to the war. At 11 o'clock service the Holy Communion was celebrated, preceded by the Litany, special prayers being inserted in each. In the evening after evensong, and before the sermon, intercessions were said for the soldiers, and all concerned in the war, their friends at home &c. The hymns and other music were suitable to the occasion and at the end of the service the National Anthem was sung. The sermons, both morning and evening, also bore on the subject of the war, the congregation being urged to pray for those at the front and in this way to help them in bringing the war to a successful conclusion and in establishing a just and lasting peace.

ON Saturday evening those who saw the two trophies in the eastern window of the Apothecaries Hall, must have felt a great deal of pride in Canada's popular game. To the casual observer there is very little difference, both being of exquisite design. Surmounting each trophy is a hockey player holding in his hand a stick. The window was also tastefully decorated with groups of the Abegweit Football team champions of the Province; Abegweit Hockey Team, Sr. champions of P. E. Island, 1899, and Crescent Hockey team, intermediate champions 1899. A group of the track team which captured the most points at the Maritime championship at Moncton last fall also exhibited.

DR. BARNARD, London, has addressed a letter to his old boys in Canada, now forming a host of upwards of 10,000. The letter is full of sound, sensible advice to the boys within the bounds of the Dominion.

THE GUARDIAN learns that a number of the wholesale liquor dealers of Canada are issuing circulars to farmers throughout this province in which they offer a special case of assorted liquors at a reduced price.

ON Saturday evening a pugilistic encounter took place on the corner of two of the principal streets of the City. The police were on hand and their appearance caused the roughs to make a hasty retreat into seclusion.

THE GUARDIAN regrets to learn that Rev. J. Teasdale was not so well during the early part of yesterday. A decided improvement however, was noticeable during the evening. It is understood that Mr. Teasdale will require a complete rest.

THE services in St. Paul's Church yesterday were largely attended. In order to accommodate the congregation in the evening chairs were placed in the aisles. A feature of the musical exercises was the solo "The Holy City" sung by the Rector.

REV. DR. BRECKEN, of Sackville, preached the annual educational sermons in the Wesley Memorial and Central Methodist churches yesterday.

A telephone message from Georgetown on Saturday evening states that the harbor is free of ice and there is practically no appearance of winter.

A DESPATCH from Halifax to the Toronto World says:—Major Williams of the Mounted Rifles and Major Borden, son of the Minister of Militia had some hot words near the barracks Monday, when Major Williams said that if Borden made any further remarks he would order him to the barracks. The interesting scene is being much discussed in military circles.

REV. WILLIAM DOBSON lectured last evening before the students and friends of the Maritime Business College. The lecturer deplored the fact that with all our educational advantages we were behind the ancient Greeks, poorer in eloquence, in art and matters of public life. The education that tells in man is the knowledge which he incorporates into his nature to bring up to the standard greatness of the position he is meant to fill in this world. The course one pursues must be practical. It must be to train the members of the body to express the thought of the mind. The powers of the mind are analysis, synthesis and judgment. Tear a subject to pieces, build it up, putting every fragment in its natural relation to every other part, and then draw one's own conclusions. He solemnly urged the students to train the will, for it brings all other faculties under its control; be able to concentrate thoughts with a tenacity of purpose. Be impressed with the greatness and possibilities of the mind, to read the history in the rocks, in all nature to love the noble and good.—Hx. Herald, 10th.

THE funeral of the late Mrs. Chas. Bell, whose sudden death occurred early Friday morning, was largely attended yesterday afternoon. The pall bearers were Messrs. Thos. Driscoll, Chas. Hermans, Jos. O. Arsenault, M. Keoughan D. O. M. Reddin and R. F. Maddingan. The services were conducted by Rev. J. F. Johnson, and after leaving the Cathedral the funeral procession was preceded by members of the League of the Cross Choir, who, together with members of the Cathedral choir, of which the sorrowing husband is an esteemed member, chanted the "Benedictus" at the grave.

ON Saturday, Messrs. A. E. Arsenault and W. P. Doull returned to the city after a week spent in Prince County. Mr. Arsenault lectured at Richmond, Misouche, Summerside, Fifteen Point, and Egmont Bay.—(the last two lectures being delivered in French) and was greeted with large and enthusiastic audiences on each occasion. The lectures were delivered under auspices of the different local societies of the Catholic church. Mr. Arsenault's reputation as a lecturer is now established in the way that will subject him to numerous calls from other parts on similar philanthropic work. Mr. Doull ably manipulated the stereopticon, and at the close of each lecture (except Summerside) delighted the audiences with a few examples of his famous biograph pictures. Mr. Doull has recently rebuilt his biograph, converting it into a combined stereopticon and biograph, and fitted for the use of either calcium or electric light and has been using it on this trip to the satisfaction and delight of all.
