OUR POULTRY BUSINESS.

The importance of the poultry business to this province is perhaps not as fully realized as it ought to be. We still retain remnants of the old-time general contempt...

Today the hen is "live stock" on a level with the remunerative dairy cow and the bacon hog. She is credited with being one of the most profitable lines of animal husbandry...

The poultry population of this province is not accurately available, the yearly additions by means of incubators and natural methods of increase placing the number beyond reach of the acturaries.

The average number of eggs laid yearly by our hens of all breeds is estimated at 75 eggs, while the highest individual performance in the last egg-laying contest reported in The Guardian a few days ago was 266.

We may figure out what such an increase would mean in the yearly revenue from this source. A fact that is not as generally known as it ought to be is that Canada does not produce enough eggs to supply our home market.

Another fact that our poultry people should carefully remember is that Prince Edward Island eggs thanks to the good work done by the Egg Circles, hold a dominating place in our markets.

In this province we have the opportunity now to increase our egg output indefinitely. We cannot glut the market and, holding as we do, the highest place in the market we can continue to hold it at a very considerable profit to ourselves.

Strange that we do not look more to these; strange that we should depend upon our police whose duty is to arrest, not to teach and to reason with the young offender, the boy who, if reasoned with might become a leader and a blessing to his country, the boy also, who if only caught and jailed may end his career in the penitentiary or on the scaffold.

EDITORIAL NOTE. Little good can be done by continued misrepresentation on the part of disgruntled and disappointed Liberals. There are a few partizan souls who are trying to cover up an awful mess left by the late government by creating situations which do not exist.

But in political complexion Prince Edward Island is an exception to the rule. As now represented it is nominally Liberal generally and very really Conservative provincially. The overturn in July last demonstrated that fact. It is safe to say that not one of the four Liberal members that we elected to Parliament in December, 1921 holds a safe seat today.

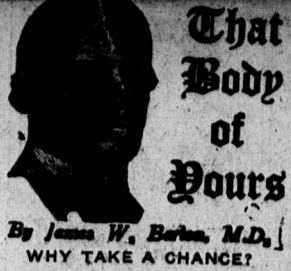
