IN MEMORIAM

MR. GEORGE D. MACLEOD

Silently on the morning of March the fifth, and without any previous warning through ill-health or sickness the angel of death entered the home at Hunter River and claimed the husband and father, George D. MacLeod one of the most highly esteemed residents of that community. The deceased, though in his 71st year had always been remarkably brisk and energetic until something over a year ago the shock caused by the death in Flanders of their beloved son Flight Lt. Elmer G. MacLeod seemed to rob him of much of his old-time vigor and it was noticed by those associated with him that he was falling in strength and appearance. Still he never complained and went about his customary work and duties up till the morning of his death, when he spoke of feeling tired, and lay down to rest and thus the swift messenger, came to him. Born at Hartsville the son of the late John MacLeod and Bessie MacKenzie (both of whom had almost reached the centenarian mark) he was the last surviving member of a family of seven brothers and two sisters. At the age of 28 years he came to Hunter River then a little village of four or five families and built up a home for himself and helped in every advance movement that has brought it to the fore as one of the most thriving little villages of the day. He was a staunch Presbyterian and one of the strong supports of the church, always taking an active part in Sunday School, Prayer meeting and everything that helped along the cause and particularly in former years was his home noted for its hospitality to clergymen many of whom living today can remember the welcome extended to them at all times beneath his roof. He is survived by his widow, formerly Isabel Cummings of Darlington, three sons James C. of Littleton, N. H., John A. and Grant of B. C.; also two daughters Mrs. Geo. H. MacMillan, Hunter River and Mrs. Ernest Ellis, Tyne Valley. His remains were followed to their last resting place in the cemetery at Hunter River by the largest concourse of people even seen in that community.

His last illness was a wonderful exemplification of Christian faith and endurance as well as of the marvellous working of God in preparing his people for eternal glory. Those who had the privilege of visiting him during his illness could not escape being impressed by his fervent prayers to Jesus, his heavenly joy and his earnest exhortations. It was truly a scene of purification in which one of God's people was brought as a little child so as to enter the Kingdom of glory. His Minister the Rev. Jas. MacDougal who visited him during his affliction and who had joined with him in his prayers and praises conducted his funeral service on Sabbath at 2 p. m. taking as his subject John 14:1. The service was very impressive especially when the minister conveyed to his hearers the last message of their departed friend—a message that told of heavenly rest and eternal happiness through the atoning merits of the blood of Jesus. Notwithstanding the almost impassable state of the roads a very large number assembled to pay the last tribute of respect to his memory and to follow his remains to their resting place in the Kirk Cemetery near by. He left nothing undone in connection with matters consequent upon his departure, even selecting the pall bearers who were William Bell, Ephraim Bell, Thomas Howatt, Frank Howatt, John Driscoll and William Campbell. Besides numerous friends and acquaintances he leaves to mourn a widow, one son Arthur on the homestead, one sister Mrs. Allan MacMillan of Wood Islands and two brothers, Montague and John of Cape Traverse.

WEATHER CONTINUES TO HOLD UP FIGHT ACROSS THE ATLANTIC

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., April 14—The chances of Harry G. Hawker, Australian aviator, "hopping off" within the next day or two in an attempt to fly across the Atlantic in competition for the London Daily Mail's \$50,000 prize diminished tonight, when a drizzling rain set in again.

The ground in front of his aviaroom on Mount Pearl Plateau is now virtually a quagmire.

Captain Frederick P. Raynham, British aviator, who is rushing the work of assembling his Martinside plane in time to take the air as soon as Hawker's Sopwith, dined tonight with his rival. He is planning, if possible to make a trial flight tomorrow, taking off from a road in front of his canvas hangar at Quidi-Vidi. It is said that if rain, fog, or wind holds Hawker back another two days Raynham will be able to give him a real race for the honor of being the first to start.

Although Hawker has expressed himself as believing his the fastest plane he has evinced no willingness to permit Raynham to get an even start if it could be avoided. He was disposed for a time to attempt a take-off today despite the soggy ground and the unfavorable wind and fog, but gave up his plans when meteorological reports received by his navigator Commander MacKenzie Grieve, R. N., warned of low pressure areas and rain squalls in mid-Atlantic.

Captain Raynham consented today for the first time to discuss his plans for the flight. Twenty-five years old, seven years an aviator, and like Hawker, originally a mechanic, he declared the proposed passage of the Atlantic was to him, "like any work away flight."

ILLS OF SLAUGHTER OF JEWS AT PINK

STOCKHOLM, April 14—The Jewish Press Bureau here is informed that a letter written by Barnett Zuckerman representative of the Joint Distribution Committee of American funds for Jewish war sufferers, relating to a slaughter of Jews in Pinsk has been published in Jewish news papers in Warsaw. On April 5th, a meeting place was surrounded by Polish soldiers, he says, and all those present were arrested taken to the market place and shot. Mr. Zuckerman then wrote to members of the Polish Diet demanding immediate intervention and the Polish Cabinet promised to investigate.

Jewish newspapers in Warsaw, the press bureau says published the names of twenty-three persons who were shot at Pinsk. Most of them belonged to the Zionist organization.

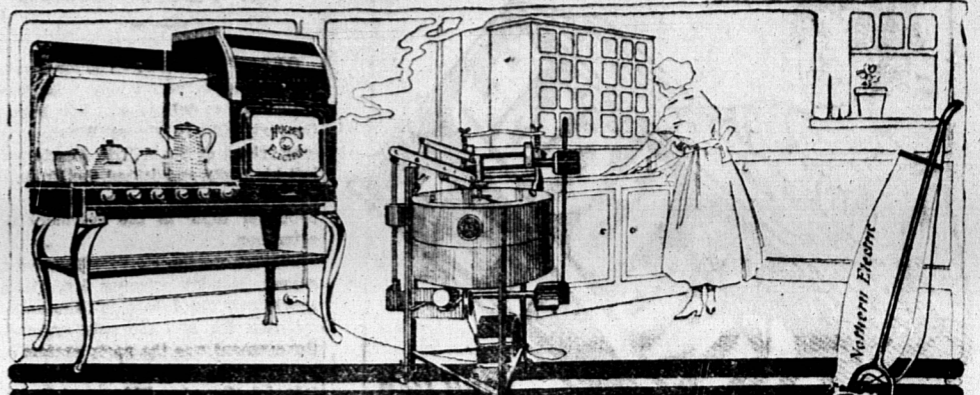
NO MAN CAN KEEP AWAKE FOR MORE THAN A FEW DAYS

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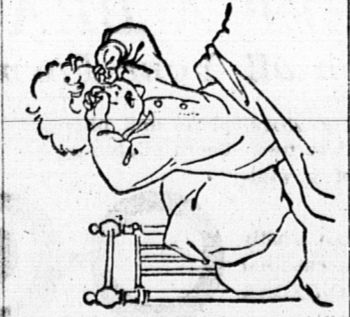
MR. HECTOR CAMPBELL
