GENERAL HAIG'S REPORT

(Continued from Page Four.)

Fought Enemy With His Own Weapon.

"The employment by the enemy of gas liquid fire compelled us not only to discover ways to protect our troops but also to devise means of using the same instruments. Great fertility of invention has been shown and great credit is due to the special personnel employed for the rapid success with which these new arms have been developed and perfected and for the no less to be displayed in difficult and dangerous service. The enemy owes thanks to the chemists, physiologists and physicists of the highest rank who devoted their energies to enabling us to surpass the enemy in the use of this means of warfare which took civilized world by surprise. Our own experience of numerous experiments and trials necessary before gas and flame could be used or the great preparations which had to be made for their manufacture and for the special training required for the personnel employed, shows that the employment of such methods by the Germans was not the result of desperation but had been prepared deliberately. Since we have been compelled in self-defence, to use similar methods, it is satisfactory to be able to record the evidence of prisoners' documents captured and our own observations that the enemy has suffered heavy casualties from our gas attacks while the means of protection adopted by us proved thoroughly effective."

TROOPS ARRIVE SAFELY IN ENGLAND

OTTAWA, December 27.—It is officially announced thru the chief press censor's office, that the following troops arrived safely in England: The 198th Irish Canadian Rangers, battalions; 23rd and 21th Alberta battalions; 23th battalion; 23th Railway construction battalion; Dratts—Artillery, Infantry, Engineers, Army Service Corps, Army Medical Corps and Dental Corps.

THE BISHOP OF LONDON

So let the way wind up, the hill, or down. Through rough or smooth, the journey will be joy. Still seeking what I sought when but a boy, New friendship, high adventure, and a crown. I shall grow old but never lose life's zest. Because the road's last turn will be the best.

"I have lived for six months in two-rooms at Fulham Palace," the Bishop of London yesterday, and he added that he was prepared to live where, how and on what scale the diocese should decide. He was presiding at the autumn session of the London Diocesan Conference, held at Church House, Westminster, and he was referring to what he described as the misrepresentations which had been made in regard to his income. "I am quite willing," he said, "that the Finance Board of the diocese shall take over the income of the bishopric, that they shall arrange for me to have a moiety, and that I shall live in some small house taken by the Finance Board, which board shall, however, keep London House (the Bishop's residence in St. James's square) and Fulham Palace for church purposes."

Fulham Palace said the bishop, has been used as a retreat, whilst London House has been used for the purpose of the National Mission. He would never, however, consent to the suggested arrangement if Fulham Palace were to cease to be in the hands of the church, or to be secularized after 1,300 years. "That would have to be an absolute part of the bargain. It would also have to be a part of the bargain that the £1,000 a year which I give to charitable objects, and which I have promised, must be kept up, because otherwise I should be disappointing those to whom I have given my personal word. "The other side of the matter—al- tho' it will have to be considered—is that the Bishop of London must be someone, placed in a position that he can have personal touch, as now, with all the important diocesan work."

FIRE BREAKS OUT IN INTERNMENT CAMP

(Special to the Guardian.) TORONTO, Jan. 2.—Fire broke out Saturday in a building in the Internment Camp at Laura on the Canadian Northern in Ontario. An Austrian named Powell, who insisted on going back to the flames to rescue his belongings was burned to death. All the other inmates escaped.

The Peace Offer

(Special to the Guardian.) BERLIN, Jan. 1.—(Wireless) The text of the Entente note replying to the peace offer of the Central Powers reached Berlin as transmitted to Paris. The general impression here is that this version is correct that the Entente answer to the sincere German offer, while verbose, nevertheless is a flat refusal to end war. This is especially regretted for the sake of neutral countries suffering from consequences of war. It is pointed out as especially remarkable that the Entente note mentions right of nationalities, although one of avowed war purposes of Entente is conquest of Constantinople and Straits.

NATIONAL SERVICE IN FULL SWING

(Special to the Guardian.) OTTAWA, Jan. 2.—National Service in full swing. Reports coming to the Director-General, R. E. Bennett, M. P., indicate that the movement will be a great success. Upwards of 30,000 National Service cards, properly filled out have already come back. They are mainly from the west where distribution took place first. Accompanied by Hon. J. D. Hays Minister of Public Works, Mr. Bennett leaves tomorrow for St. John where a National Service meeting will be held on Thursday night followed by one at Halifax on Friday where the tour of the Dominion will have been completed.

Somme Casualties

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, Jan. 1.—The total British casualties reported from Dec. 1 to Dec. 23 were officers 315, men 36,550, total 36,865. Effect cessation of the Somme offensive the advent of unfavorable weather conditions is shown in these figures which give a daily average of 1,158 casualties for 24 days covered by the report. In November the daily average was 2,458 and in October 3,452. Total British casualties since beginning of Somme offensive to 520,017.
