That Car of Yours

Heart-to-Heart Talks With Automobile Owners and Drivers on How to Get the Most Out of Their Cars at the Least Expense.

REMOVING THAT ICE

There probably is nothing more annoying about winter driving than the collection of snow and ice crystals on the windshield. There are several means of diminishing the bad effect. One is to apply a solution of salt water to the glass. A thin film of glycerine on the surface is another remedy.

PROTECT HOOD FINISH

Alcohol spilled upon the hood when added to as an anti-freeze should be flushed off immediately with cold water.

LOOSE SHOE THE CAUSE

Brake squeaks today are the same in their effect but the cause may differ from that of a few years ago. Before the arrival of enclosed brakes, mud, grit, and water getting on the linings were responsible for much of the brake noise. Now, however, a brake squeak may be due to looseness in the shoe itself.

IT IS NOISY WEATHER

If the car seems noisier in cold weather, it is comforting to know that the cause may be only contraction of otherwise close fitting parts.

PAINT OUT THE RUST

Rust does its worst in winter. That is why the first sign of a rust spot on fenders, splashers, or other part of the car should be the owner's cue to get out the kerosene and paint brush. First remove every trace of the rust, then apply a protective coating of paint.

OVERFLOW MAY BE BLOCKED

When the car begins to steam and one knows it is not frozen he should have a look at the radiator overflow pipe. If it is stopped up, the steam has no normal way of escape.

PROTECTS ENGINE OIL

Another reason for buying more volatile gasoline in winter is that it helps reduce the dilution of the engine oil. Most motorists buy it because it facilitates starting, a good enough reason without doubt. The fact that it is more combustible, however, is a definite protection to the engine lubricant.

KEEP OUT OF ICY BUTS

Where it can be done, it is well to refrain from driving in ruts formed on the icy or snowy surfaced road. The effect is the same as driving in car tracks, so far as tires are concerned.

NEW FILTER CARTRIDGE

Motorists who have not thought of it for some time might consider replacement of the oil filter cartridge at this season. The oils needs all the filtering it can get.

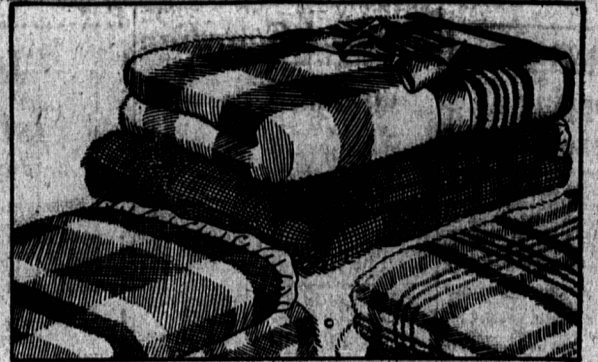

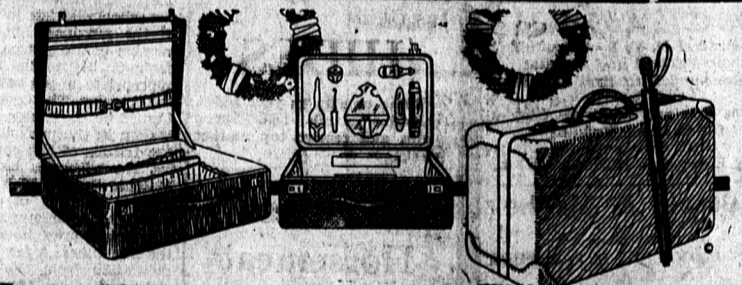
