NEW YORK, March 13.—The 5 000 Doukhozortis, or Russia Quakers, who were brought out to Canada a few years since in order to escape the persecutions to which they were subjected in the Czar's domains, now threaten, says a special to the Times from Montreal, to leave Canada because they consider the free laws of this country too oppressive for them.
