Win Argument In Grain Rates Fight

OTTAWA, Dec. 2 - (CP) - The Prairie Provinces today marked up a major win in their fight to preserve Western Canada's special low rates on grain and grain products. An argument before the Royal Commission on Transportation culminated in a commission ruling that it would not conduct an inquiry into whether or not the grain charges - known as the "Crows' Nest Pass" rates - are a money-losing proposition for the railways. The Canadian Pacific Railways contends it loses heavily on the state-fixed rates and has asked the commission for a recommendation that they be removed from the statutes. It wanted the Board to inquire into whether they are "compensatory" - that is, whether they pay their way.

Bank Robbed Second Time In Two Weeks

MONTREAL, Dec. 2 - (CP) - Provincial Police reported today that La Banque Canadienne Nationale at St. Hugue de Bagot, near St. Hyacinthe, had been held up and robbed of an unknown sum of money. It is the same bank from which three men took \$3,600 two weeks ago, holding up two sisters and their elderly mother who is manager of the branch bank. The three men who staged the earlier holdup were captured within three hours and on their way to penitentiary within 16 hours. They pleaded guilty and were given terms of four and five years. Provincial Police here said no details of today's holdup were known immediately.

Route-Tooting Popular Pastime At Ottawa Now

OTTAWA, Dec. 2 - (CP) - Route-tooting has become a popular pastime on Parliament Hill. To be a route-tooter you must toot the horn for what you think should be the route of the proposed trans-Canada highway. Route-tooting reached a peak in the Commons as members discussed and finally passed, a bill authorizing the Federal Government to pay by half the cost of a 5,000-mile \$300,000,000 coast-to-coast two-lane highway. Route-tooters weren't confined to members from any one part of the country and the scenic attractions of Canada's island extremities were tossed into the route-tooting pot. All considered, it was a colorful illustration of the way in which the various members look out for their particular constituencies. But it was also a rather frustrating display of publicity tooting. Reason is that the route of the highway will be decided by the individual Provinces. The only thing the Federal Government has to say is that the route must be as short as possible and practical. P.E. Cote (L-Matapedia-Matane) said: "After the Rockies the most beautiful scenery in Canada is to be found in the Matapedia Valley and of the Gaspé Peninsula. It will be much easier to go from Rivière du Loup to Campbellton and then to Edmundston, N.B." Percy Black (PC-Cumberland) had something to say about the Nova Scotia route. "The highway should go to Cape Breton in order to tie up with the highway in Newfoundland." W. Chester S. McLure (PC-Queens) wanted the shortest route on Prince Edward Island. It would follow through Borden, Victoria, Crapaud and Charlottetown. The saving in distance over the old route would be 14 miles which would pay for a new bridge over the North River. Mr. McLure also emphasized that Federal payments for highways should include the ferry service across Northumberland Strait from Tormentine, N.B., to Borden.

Perfumed Ink Latest Stunt

By FRED KERNER NEW YORK, Dec. 2 (CP) - "But honey," said Mr. Average Husband, "that's not somebody's perfume on me; it's only the latest copy of your favorite magazine!" Far-fetched? Not really, because the latest thing in printing magazines is adding pleasant aromas to the ink. Can't you just see - or rather smell - those perfume advertisements? What a hazard to add to the list for men with suspicious wives or snooping mothers-in-law. The first experiment came off the presses today - a nature magazine printed with the tansy smell of pine trees exuding from the pages. That smell the postman is wondering about is not a package of pine soap or bath salts, it's just the December issue of Natural History published by the American Museum of Natural History. A little confusion is added to the magazine's cover does not portray pine trees - it is a lovely photograph of cactus blossoms. Next month the editors will try to co-ordinate the smell and the picture. And they promise to keep skunks off their cover. The experiment by the museum's magazine is believed to be the first time a magazine printed on slick paper has tried to add olfactory pleasure to the delights of literature. The problem encountered by the editors and printers was to make the odor not too strong but at the same time to have it last. Experimental sheets held the aroma for more than a week while lying uncovered. The closed magazine is expected to retain the fragrance much longer.
