DO ONIONS MAKE YOU CRY?

Crying is Nature's way of protecting the eyes from the stinging which the onion would cause in your eyes if the tears did not come quickly and overcome the bad effect so produced. Tears are provided for washing the ball of your eyes. Every time you wink a little tear is released from under the eyelid, and the wink spreads it all over the eyeball. This washes down the front of the eyeball and cleanses it of all dust and other things that fly at the eye from the air, says the Book of Wonders. Then the tear runs along a little channel, much like a trough, at the lower part of the eye, and out through a little hole in the eye, and in this case the tear is really an eye-wash. Many things, but more often sadness or injured feelings, start the tears coming so fast from under the eyelid that the little trough at the bottom and the hole in the corner of the eye are too small to hold them or carry them off, so they roll over the edge of the lower eyelid and down the face. These are what we call tears. Among other things that will cause tear glands to cause an overflow of eye-wash to come down are onions. What they give off is very trying to the eyes, and so, just as soon as the something which an onion throws off hits the eyeball the nerves of the eye telegraph the brain to turn on the tears quickly, and they come in a little deluge and counteract the bad effect of the onion.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, or certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along the line of the land in each of three years. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. CORY, C. M. C. SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

September 30. REVIEW—THE GOODNESS AND SEVERITY OF GOD. (Dan. 9:3-19.)

Golden Text.—"Jehovah is merciful and gracious, slow to anger, and abundant in loving kindness."—Psa. 103:8

A careful study of the quarter's lessons gives a fairly comprehensive view of the decline and fall of the Kingdom of Judah. We have been studying the last part of the history of Judah as a nation, and the first part of the history of the Babylonian captivity.

Lesson 1. Isaiah is supposed to have been a wealthy, gifted, highly cultured and popular young man of Jerusalem. God honored him with a special call to a special work, and he eagerly and gladly obeyed his Lord, even at the cost of great difficulties and danger. He knew—for God had told him—that disaster was coming to Israel. He also knew—for God had told him—that a Saviour would come who would bring deliverance. Isaiah was God's messenger to his own people.

Lesson 2. The Royal Renegade.—There is no sight more pitiful than of a great leader who proves faithless to a noble cause. Loyalty to high calling, fidelity to great responsibility—these are the qualities of character that are needed everywhere just as much as they were in the troublous times of nearly three thousand years ago. Is our Sunday school doing its

utmost to develop and train such character?

Lesson 3. Hezekiah "trusted in the Lord God" (2 Kings 18:5); sent invitations all over the country calling people to worship God, kept on doing right though they "laughed" the messengers "to scorn."

Lesson 4. Two kings—Hezekiah shut up in Jerusalem by a siege—trusting God; Sennacherib with a great and powerful army—trusting to idols, scorning Hezekiah's God. What did Hezekiah do? Prayed, fought, trusted. The result—deliverance. With God—Success. Without God—Failure.

Lesson 5. The Call of All Nations—God's invitation never ceases. No matter how long the call remains unheeded, still it sweetly sounds. Some of the greatest triumphs in the history of missions were won during the past year of world conflict. The church of God is awakened to a new realization of the Great Commission to teach the nations to know God. Some way, out of the storm and stress shall arise the world-wide Kingdom of the Prince of Peace.

Lesson 6. A boy king began to reign when only twelve years old, chose wrong instead of right, led his people into great wickedness. Was taken captive by a heathen king, led away with a ring through his nostrils. Who was he, Manasseh. Repented, turned to God for forgiveness, was returned once more to Jerusalem with a scarred face and a scarred life. Sin—always leaves scars, even though God forgives.

Lesson 7. What boy king only eight years old decided to do right in spite of great evils around him? Josiah. What did he do as a boy and young man to improve his surroundings? Tried to get rid of evils around him, and tried to encourage goodness. What was the secret of his success and usefulness? He began serving God early.

Lesson 8. What roll of manuscript did one of the priests find in an unused room of the temple among the rubbish? What did it prove to be? How did Josiah make the most of this Bible? Read it, studied its meanings, obeyed its teaching.

Lessons 11, 12, 13. Four promising young Jews of the captivity were given the highest educational advantages that far-famed Babylon, under the mighty Nebuchadnezzar, could furnish. That was a rarer chance, than that afforded by a Rhodes scholarship. Those were lucky fellows; they had great opportunities for brilliant careers. But with those opportunities came mighty temptations to forget home, fatherland and God. They were equal to the situation. They made good. Probably they were the only tentacles in the university. Never mind, they knew it was not best for them to touch intoxicants. They deliberately planned their work, sleep, eating and exercise with relation to that which was best worth while. As a result they were the healthiest, best-looking men on the campus; they mastered textbooks, earned high marks, and won the prizes. Of course they were ridiculed as "plouderers." But they had an idea of amounting to something and could not be laughed out of it. One became the most learned man of his time, the renowned councillor of kings. They were so true to the virtues of integrity, fidelity, obedience and conscience, that one of them, Daniel, preferred to be given to the lions rather than to do wrong. The others, Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego, were thrown into a furnace because they would not commit the fashionable sins of the day.
