Silver Fox Farming



George MacLeod, fox fieldman for the Provincial Government of New Brunswick, was one of the visitors at the Provincial Fox Show this week.

The five fox show will be held in two divisions: the exhibition will be allowed to show in one division only. Division A for registered foxes and Division B for unregistered foxes.

The pelt show is being organized to create additional interest in the production of high class pelts to meet the demand of the fur trade, and for the purpose of bringing to the attention of the trade the high quality of New Brunswick fox pelts.

The rules in brief are:—Exhibitors are required to take out membership with the New Brunswick Fox Breeders' Association for 1938 and the annual fee is \$1.00.

There will be four color classes as shown in the classification and the competitive pelts shown by the exhibitors will be limited to five in each class.

SUNDAY is supposed to be a day of rest even on a fox ranch. Feed Ross-Miller Standard Cubes on Sundays and save yourself work and time.

CLASSIFICATION. All skins for entry must show good clear color character. Class 1. Full silver or extra pale silver. To be eligible for entry in this class foxes shall show over 85% silver.

PRIZES. All skins in the competitive classes will be graded in the first, second and third divisions for each class, and cards or ribbons will be awarded.

The Charlottetown Fur Sales

The Charlottetown Fur Sales Limited in common with other fur marketing organizations is making preparations for the approaching fur shipping season.

This Company has been in business since 1934 and has recently undergone some slight re-organization, due to the loss by death of the President, Mr. G. Holsey Hooper. The new president of the Company, Lt.-Col. Andrew, a prominent fox rancher and farmer in Charlottetown, whose connection with the fox farming business has placed him among leaders wherever silver fox men are known.

The pelting and Cleaning Plant is an interesting place with beautiful white rooms, heated by electricity and white-topped tables are seen on every hand. We were informed by our guide that this is the only completely equipped pelting and drying plant in this country where the power units are all electric, insuring uniform treatment of the skins in the process of curing.

The pelting of foxes is a big department in this firm's business and has grown by leaps and bounds until today it is in a position to pelting in the vicinity of 5,000 foxes during the pelting season.

The Grading Room on the top floor to which the skins are removed by elevator from the Cleaning Department in the basement, is a very large room 60 ft. long by 30 ft. wide with plate glass windows in the Northeast end high above the surrounding buildings and free from shadows or the direct glare of the sun.
