that he would again be with us in his usual spot in the grand stand at Old Home Week in 1948. For years we had the privilege of corresponding with him and always looked forward to seeing him at our race meets. In the long ago the name of E. LeKol Willis was one to conjure with. He operated one of the principal hotels in Saint John, N.B. and Sydney, N.S. and had many other interests. He had the faculty of making friends and holding them and was a true sportsman, his greatest love being harness horses. In his day he owned many good ones, but perhaps the one he loved best was Special Blend, a son of the celebrated Black Pilot, and was the first Maritime bred stallion to trot in 2:30. Many will remember the celebrated Black Pilot-Hernando race in Summerside.

Mr. Willis set up track trotting records on seven Maritime ovals and in 1886 and 1897 Special Blend was credited as the fastest horse owned and bred in the Maritimes, his record being 2:18-1/4. He held the track trotting record at Charlottetown for a long period and his sixth heat in a winning seven heat race made in 1897-2:21—stood as a record for years. The passing of Mr. Willis will be regretted by hundreds who read this short tribute but his memory will not pass but will be preserved through the fine reminiscences which we can conjure up. He had attained the grand old age of 87.

Paterson Wins Empty Victory

LONDON, Oct. 17 — (AP) — Jackie Paterson is the flyweight champion of the world in Great Britain and the British Empire again today but only in the eyes of a British court.

The court granted Paterson an injunction restraining the British Boxing Board of Control from recognizing anyone other than Paterson as the flyweight champ, but Sam Ichinose, manager of the Hawaiian flyweight contender, Dado Marino, is not concerned over the legal victory won by Paterson. Ichinose said, "the matter should have been settled long ago . . . in any case, Paterson is out of the picture so far as the world flyweight title is concerned and the winner of Monday's fight, whether it be Rinty Monaghan or Marino, will be recognized by the National Boxing Association of America."

Promoter Jack Solomons said he would go ahead with the Marino-Monaghan fight Monday night "for the flyweight championship of the world." The British board previously had authorized the fight for the title. What action the board will take in view of the injunction has not been announced.

On the same card Paterson is scheduled to fight Norman Lewis for the British and British Empire bantamweight titles. "Paterson will appear so far as I know," Solomons added.

The board deprived Paterson of his crest last summer when he failed to weigh in for a scheduled title fight with Marino. The American National Boxing Association also declared the flyweight title vacant.

Fog Halts Hockey Game At Washington

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17 — (AP) — Fog caused an American League Hockey contest between Washington Lions and Hershey Bears at Uline Arena tonight to be cancelled after officials had ruled that further play was impossible.

It was a mild autumn night with the temperature about 70 degrees.

The Bears led 1-0 when the contest was halted for keeps after three previous temporary interruptions due to fog.

Gordie Bruce, Bear wingman, had poked a point-blank shot after 1:12 of the opening period to put the champs ahead, 1-0. Fog, which had accumulated slowly as play got under way, became so bad that the ice was cleared of players when the first period was only five minutes old and four Lions, with blankets, attempted to clear the murk.

They succeeded and play continued for three minutes, when the fog returned. This time all the players raced around the rink waving their sticks to dispel it. Again play started, and again it stopped, after a couple of minutes.

Officials decided to call the first period over after 10:47. They also decided to tack the remaining 9 minutes and 47 seconds of the first period on to the second stanza.

A further decision was made to flood the ice.

This was done and the players returned for the marathon second session. After six minutes of play, the fog rose again. The managers conferred with the officials and decided to stop the game.

Uline officials are awaiting word from League headquarters in New York as to whether the game will be re-played.

Boston To Welcome Rescued Passengers From Downed Plane

BOSTON, Oct. 17 — (AP) — The City of Boston and the American Red Cross tonight to greet the Coast Guard cutter Bibb and the 69 plane passengers and crew members the Bibb's crew saved from death in the North Atlantic early in the week.

The Bibb, latest reports said, is due to dock here about noon EST on Sunday with the survivors of the trans-Atlantic clipper, Bermuda Sky Queen.

Acting Mayor John B. Hynes will lead a delegation of city officials down Boston Harbor in police and fire boats to welcome the rescuers and rescued.

Metropolitan (Boston) Chapter of the Red Cross has arranged to meet the survivors at the dock with clothing and comfort kits.

The chapter said the male survivors need shoes, stockings and shirts. The women need complete clothing outfits.

Layettees will be ready for the infants aboard.

Window Seats At Wedding Expensive

LONDON, Oct. 17 — (CP) — With the Royal wedding a little more than four weeks away, the prices of window seats overlooking the 1-1/2-mile procession route from Buckingham Palace to Westminster Abbey are soaring beyond the reach of the average man.

They are well in excess of the prices asked at the 1937 coronation, the 1935 jubilee and the wedding of the Duke and Duchess of Kent in 1924.

Office window seats overlooking Parliament Square, close by the Abbey, which at the coronation rented for £20 (\$80), now are fetching as much as £65 (\$140). One reason given for the higher prices is that the route has been shortened. Apart from that . . . Safecrackers Get \$25,000 In Precious Metals

TORONTO, Oct. 17 — (CP) — Masked by long blue stockings pulled over their heads, a well-organized gang of safecrackers escaped today with about \$25,000 worth of gold and other precious metals rifled from two safes at the nearby Mallon plant of the Stauffer Pen Company.

Nightwatchman at the plant, Ernest Mann, was gagged with adhesive tape and tied to a chair before being pounded over the head. In poor health for some time and almost overcome by shock, Mann was unable to say if more than two men took part in the robbery.

As he stepped from the small building outside the wire fence that surrounds the plant at Mallon, Mann was faced by two men who ordered him into the vault room where the precious metal is stored.

The thugs plastered adhesive tape over their victim's eyes, gagged him and then bound his wrists and ankles with tape. They forced him to sit in a chair and fastened him to it with a polka dot scarf. Mann was dazed by repeated blows on the head.

The watchman said they worked for about an hour, setting the charge. When the explosives blew a minor fire started in the nib de-

See Surplus Of Rubber In Sight

AKRON, O., Oct. 17 — (AP) — The rubber and tire industry of the United States, catching up with civilian demand for its product, will use approximately 1,045,000 tons of rubber this year and already is disturbed over the probability of an early world surplus.

This is the viewpoint of spokesmen for the rubber industry in this capital of the American rubber and tire manufacturing business, who point out that far-reaching economic and social problems are inevitable with a world surplus of rubber.

They estimate that next year's consumption of rubber, both natural and synthetic, will drop off to about 870,000 tons as a backlog of unfilled orders is leveled off.

Approximately half the rubber used this year—and next—will be of the synthetic type.
