MARK TWAIN'S FAMOUS STORY

Picturized at Prince Edward Before Delighted Audience.

Out of "A Connecticut Yankee in King Arthur's Court." William Fox has made one of the merriest photoplays that I have seen for a long time. There are many innovations to bring the story up to date, and one of the biggest laughs comes through some of the new business. When King Arthur is captured by Morgan le Fay, "Sir Boss" as the Yankee has been dubbed, rustled off to a telephone concealed in a tree-trunk and gets on to Camelot! It is a perfect scream to see the fair damsel of the period (A. D. 528) putting him through to the Court. Then Sir Lancelot and his company set out on motor-bikes to the rescue. Another very funny incident is when Sir Boss lassoes the evil Sir Sagramore and unhorses him. I must tell you that in this scene Sir Boss is dressed as a cowboy, and has thereby much advantage over his opponent who is hampered by his armour. The titling is mainly composed of modern American locations, and this, taken in conjunction with seriousness with which the play is given, has a wonderfully funny effect. It is a contradiction, but the gravity with which the whole thing is played adds much to its joyousness. Indeed, it is the essence of the whole thing. The acting all round is excellent, but especially good are Harry Myers, as the Yankee, William V. Mong as Merlin; and Pauline Starke, as Demoiselle Sandy. The photography is fine and the costume seem to be real things. It is really a very fine production and it must attract every body. The final showing of this great comedy film takes place today at 7 and 8.45 p. m.

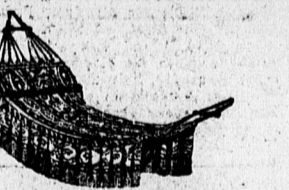
