Eastern King's Board Of Trade

The annual meeting of the Eastern King's Board of Trade was held at Souris on February 9, in the Town Hall, with the president, Mr. T. J. Kickham in the chair.

Mr. Kickham in reporting on the year's activities of the executive, told the large and representative gathering that the results of the Board's work in 1948 were quite evident in the survey of Souris harbor now underway which promises to result in a million dollar harbour and wharf improvement project.

Many important resolutions were passed. One to the Hon. C. D. Howe, Minister of Trade and Commerce, asked that the projected Trans-Canada Highway be routed in the King's County, to connect East Point with Wood Islands ferry terminal, via Souris, Annandale, Carigan, Montague, Allison and Murray River.

A resolution petitioned the Canadian National Railways to install warning signals of the audio alarm type on four of the grade crossings in Souris, to remodel or replace the seventy-year old railway station in Souris and to provide a cement sidewalk on railway property connecting Chapel and Hebb streets.

A protest to the Provincial Government asking for better highways and secondary roads in Eastern King's, and especially deploring the dangerous condition of the Souris West bridge which for some time has been posted with a tonnage limit, was strongly supported by all present with a resolution to provide funds sufficient in the next budget to take care of same.

The attention of the Minister of Public Works, Hon. G. H. Barbour, was directed to Mr. A. G. L. Leard, who has never had benefit of snow fences at strategic places. Another resolution asked the Island Motor Transport Co. Ltd. to arrange their schedule if possible so that the people from the country coming on the bus at Leard should have a shopping period of at least an hour and a half.
