NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—The Herald says—Speculating in the stock of the United States Steel Corporation, King Edward, of England, has just cleared more than a million dollars as the harvest of a three months' bullish market for the Steel shares, according to a story told here.

after the interview a big brokerage house in Wall Street received heavy orders from the King's agents to purchase Steel common. At the time Steel common was purchased from \$50 up. In the King's account 50,000 shares were acquired. During the three months that followed American stocks had a big prosperity the price of Steel common rose steadily. Saturday night it closed at 76 1/4.

A CLOSE CALL FOR HER LIFE

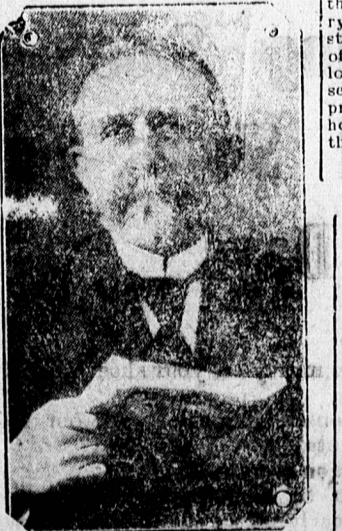

NAVAL TUG WAS OVERTURNED

Several of Crew Including the Captain Believed to Be Drowned.

ROCKPORT, Mass., Aug. 11.—(Special)—A naval tug, Nezinecott, Capt. Evans, bound from Portsmouth to Boston capsized off Cape Ann today and several of the crew were drowned. The second officer, the Captain's wife, her little boy and four of the crew landed on the Cape from the tug's boat.

SELF-SUPPORTING NAVY FAVORED

LONDON, Aug. 10.—Sir Frederick Borden and Hon. L. P. Broderick today met Mr. Reginald McKenna, Admiral Sir John Fisher, and other Admiralty officials in order to discuss the technical points in regard to Canada's scheme of assistance to the Imperial Naval defence. Canada, it is understood, is of the opinion that the Dominion should have a self-supporting navy, which should form an integral part of the Imperial navy in the time of emergency.

NEW FURNACE AT "SOO."

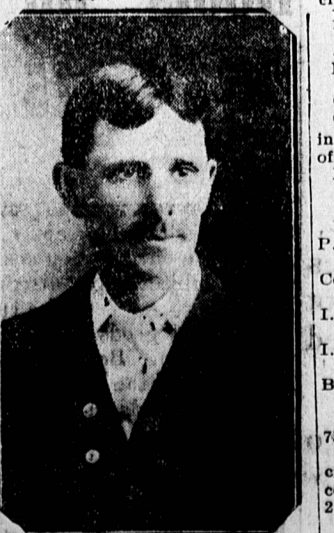
SAULT STE. MARIE, Aug. 10.—The Lake Superior Corporation will commence the work of building their new blast furnace and merchant mill this week. When completed, the work will represent an expenditure of \$50,000,000 and will require from one to two years for completion.

MINES TO CLOSE DOWN.

MONTREAL, August 11.—The Cumberland Coal Co has decided to close down the mines at Springhill, indefinitely. The statement was made by Mr. Drummond, President of the Company, who added, "Until affairs are upon a base where we can make a profit at business." Drummond stated that the report that Wagoner Cowans had issued a notice offering to take back the men on the old terms was misleading as the Company will not now take back the men on those terms.

POPE PIUS CELEBRATES.

ROME, Aug. 10.—The sixth anniversary of the coronation of Pope Pius X. was celebrated with great pomp today. High mass was celebrated in the Sistine chapel, with Cardinal Merry del Val, the papal secretary of state, pontificating. A large number of the cardinals, members of the diplomatic corps and the aristocracy and several of the Pope's relatives were present. This afternoon a concert in honor of the occasion was given at the Vatican.

MURDERED WIFE WHILE SHE SLEPT

Hotel Keeper Kills His Wife After a Long Drinking Bout.

BOBCAYGEON, Ont., Aug. 10.—Joseph Hunter, proprietor of the Hotel Royal here, brutally murdered his wife, Rose, about 4 o'clock Saturday morning shooting her through the head with a 38-calibre rifle as she lay sleeping in her bed. Hunter is said to have been crazed with liquor at the time, and to have been prompted by a spirit of jealousy, although neighbors say he had no reason to question his wife's faithfulness.

BIG FIRE AT VERNON.

VERNON, B. C., August 11.—Fire destroyed the Okanagan Hotel at Vernon. Eleven persons perished in the flames. Five are in the Hospital. The building was three stories high with forty eight rooms and was a mass of flames before the alarm was turned in. The stairways had been destroyed and the guests were tumbling out on the fire escapes or leaping out in the rear. The fire was mainly confined to the Hotel. The building was on Main Street and was surrounded by prominent business houses. The Royal Bank, Morris' Drug Store and Lovelidges Real Estate office were considerably damaged. A man named Pickling lost his life after saving his daughter, Singlet, the proprietor, went back for a domestic and was caught in the flames. The Hotel belonged to Singlet and Ahlers. The loss is \$25,000. The building was partly insured.

FAMOUS AUTHOR'S WIFE HAS DISAPPEARED

GLOVERSVILLE, N. Y., Aug. 10.—Reports thus far not fully confirmed reached Gloversville at an early hour this morning stating that Mrs. Robert W. Chambers, wife of the author, is missing from the Chambers summer home, at Broad Albin. It is stated that Mrs. Chambers who is devoted to horseback riding, went out early last evening on a spirited horse. About an hour or an hour and a half later the unmounted horse appeared at the Chambers stable, and at 11 o'clock last night no trace of Mrs. Chambers had been found, although it was stated that several parties were searching every possible place where she might have been thrown and injured.

HANLAN'S POINT WIPED OUT BY A BAD FIRE.

TORONTO, August 11.—Hanlan's Point pleasure resort across the Bay has been wiped out by fire. The loss is estimated at \$125,000. One girl, Clara Andrews, lost her life in the flames. The fire started in the Gem theatre from a chemical mixture placed there to furnish colored lights for the ballet dancers. Miss Andrews who lost her life was carried at the "Figure Eight." She was confined in a cage with a wire front and when the flames cut off escape from behind, a policeman tore the front off the cage to give her a chance. The girl made an effort to save the cash, but the flames closed around the young woman and the heat drove the rescuers back. Nothing more was seen of the young girl until her charred remains were recovered when the fire was extinguished. Two other girls had their hair singed but escaped with their lives.
