### EXTENSIVE PROGRAM TO HELP WORKLESS

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 10.—(By The Canadian Press)—With a view to relieving the unemployment situation, particularly as this affects single men, the Department of National Defense is about to embark on an extensive programme throughout the country of clearing and establishing aviation landing fields. The work would be concentrated chiefly on these three stretches of the country where no landing fields existed, Montreal to Halifax, Ottawa and Toronto to Winnipeg and Lethbridge to Vancouver.

### Sandbags Buried To Get Insurance

BRUSSELS, Belgium, Oct. 10.—Belgian police said Roumanian authorities today confirmed the reported fake burial in that country of Nicolai Nicolaidis, arrested here on an insurance hoaxer and implicated by authorities in several North American insurance swindles. Police said he is wanted in Montreal for a Labor insurance hoax.

Police here said Nicolaidis admitted a supposed body buried under his assumed name Nicolai in Roumania was a sandbag and that the hoax was staged in order to obtain 50,000 Swiss francs (about \$10,000). They dug up the coffin in a cemetery at Barbatocci and found it filled with sand.

### Sad Death Of Young Bride

PICTOU, N. S., Oct. 10.—Mrs. John G. Reeves was burned to death today in the home to which she had come as a bride six weeks ago. She died in hospital here three hours after her husband rushed home in response to a frantic telephone call to find his wife moaning on the floor, the charred remains of her clothing about her. Physicians could do nothing to save her life.

### Gun, Cartridges Found Under Cot In Bathurst Jail

BATHURST, Oct. 10.—Investigation is under way following the discovery of a revolver and seven cartridges beneath a cot in a cell in the Gloucester county jail here. The discovery was made on Tuesday last, police now reveal, on the day that Joseph Norman "Rufus" Pitre was receiving hearing here on charges of attempting to break jail and having stolen goods in his possession and the day on which the appeal division of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick, sitting at Fredericton, was giving judgment for a new trial on the murder charge on which he had been acquitted here in August.

The revolver and ammunition were found as the result of a "tip" given the Royal Canadian Mounted Police that they had been passed through a window of the jail to a prisoner, whose identity the police have not revealed.

### Disarmament

LONDON, Oct. 10.—The presence in London this week of the Premier of France and an important United States statesman foregrounds important developments in the problem of world disarmament. Premier Herriot is coming here Thursday for a heart-to-heart talk with Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald and Sir John Simon, British Secretary of Foreign Affairs, on the whole range of Anglo-French relations. Norman H. Davis, United States delegate to the Geneva disarmament conference, already in London and is starting a series of conferences with officials of the British Government. One of the tasks confronting Mr. MacDonald is to determine whether a conference of four or five powers concerning Germany's demand for arms equality can be held in London or elsewhere.

## SOLE SURVIVOR TELLS STORY OF HORROR

### Miner Has Narrow Escape While 19 Companions Perish In Shaft

LEIGH LANCAASHIRE, Oct. 10.—(Canadian Press Cable)—Robert Kelshaw, sole survivor of a mine shaft accident in which nineteen were killed here today told a story of horror tonight, as he recalled details of a cage crash which drowned his companions.

"I was the last man to enter the cage," Kelshaw said "and as a result was nearest the door. Everything seemed all right till we got about 20 yards from the bottom of the shaft when the cage suddenly stopped." "One man shouted 'what's up now?' and in a second the cage lurched to the bottom and was submerged in water. 'It was a case of every man for himself!' the survivor continued. 'I had my back to the door. Using all my strength, I fought to turn around and managed to life the gate just enough to scramble out. 'I simply shot to the surface despite the fact my senses were going and managed to grasp the winding rope to which I clung until another rope was lowered from the top. 'I scrambled up this until a ladder was lowered and I was hauled to the surface, he concluded.

The accident was said to have been caused by a defect in the lifting gear of the cage.

## OPPOSITIONISTS MINIMIZE CONFERENCE

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 10.—The domestic problems of Canada are of far more importance than ratification of Imperial Conference agreements, the House of Commons was told this afternoon by leaders of the Opposition groups. They urged that Premier Bennett give as early as possible an outline of what action would be taken to meet the unemployment problem and general depression. Completion of the debate on the Address before adjournment was also urged upon the Prime Minister.

## Lloyd George Condemns Free Traders' Action

LONDON, Oct. 10.—David Lloyd George, former Liberal Prime Minister wrote a caustic letter today to the National Liberal Federation which extinguished hope that a Liberal reunion might arise from the resignation of free-trade members of the National Cabinet. The white-haired political veteran from Wales refused an invitation from the Federation to attend a meeting at Queens Hall on Wednesday at which he was asked to express approval of the free-traders action in resigning. After flatly refusing the invitation, Mr. Lloyd George's letter proceeded to berate the resigned Ministers. He asked how he could celebrate their favor with their party after he warned Sir Herbert Samuel, former Home Secretary, against what he termed the inevitable consequences of the "disastrous" dissolution of the party last year which resulted in the country's traditional free trade being "given away."

## Are Critical

LONDONDERRY, Northern Ireland, Oct. 10.—(Canadian Press Cable)—The Government's proposal to invite the Prince of Wales for the formal opening of the new Houses of Parliament was approved by the Council today. Ulster Nationalists who hold less than one fourth of the seats in Parliament were strongly critical of the proposal.
