OF SPECIAL INTEREST

GENEVA, July 16 (Special).—A huge iron barrier on lines similar to an ancient portcullis at the Swiss entrance to Simpson Tunnel, which was intended to be lowered in the event of war to prevent invasion from Italy, fell accidentally on Tuesday because of the breaking of the chains.

LONDON, July 17 (Special).—Passengers on London trams are to enjoy a privilege long in the possession of patrons of surface cars in the crowded cities of the United States. The London County Council has just presented to the Private Bill Committee of the House of Commons an omnibus bill in which powers are asked to carry an additional number of inside passengers for which the car is licensed. This means that strangers may in future grace the interior of cars. In the past extra passengers have always been removed by policemen constantly on the lookout for even one extra passenger. When this unfortunate person was discovered he was at once ejected by the constable, and the conductor of the car promptly summoned before a magistrate and fined.

During the coal strike, when the railway tram service was discontinued, it was found desirable to wink at the practice of straphanging, which is now regarded as a great convenience to the public.

The Commons Committee is inclined to favor the innovation, which, it is suggested, is to be permitted only in inclement weather, on Sundays, bank or other public holidays, on Saturdays after midday, and on such occasions as the Commissioner of Police may regard as a "special occasion."

PARIS, July 19.—(Special).—One of the principal features of the Sixth International Congress on Religious Progress, which opened here last night, was a debate on the subject "Is a Universal Religion Possible or Desirable? If so, How, Can it Be Attained?"

Mr. Etienne Emile Boutroux, professor of philosophy at the University of Paris and a member of the Academy, presided. The first congress was initiated by the American Unitarian body in 1900, and the number and eminence of the delegates at this year's meeting is attracting much attention in the religious and scientific world.

The Rev. Samuel A. Eliot, president of the American Unitarian Association, will read a paper on "Heroes of Religious Liberty," while the other speakers will include Professor Rudolf Otto, of Göttingen University; Mr. Theodore Reinach, member of the Chamber of Deputies; Signor Romolo Murri, formerly an abbe and leader of the Catholic Democrats; the one-time Italian Premier, Signor Luigi Luzzatti, and representatives of Hindoo and Persian sects.

THE WEATHER

THE TEMPERATURE TIDE, MOON ETC

(Special to the Guardian.) TORONTO, July 22.—Light to moderate winds a few local showers but mostly fair, not much change in temperature.

THE WEATHER.—Yesterday was clear with bright sunshine in the morning; cloudy with rain in the late afternoon; continuing cloudy at night.

The temperature at three o'clock this morning by the Rexal Store tested thermometer with a northern exposure was fifty-six degrees above zero and with a southern was fifty-eight above.

The highest temperature recorded yesterday was seventy-four degrees above zero and the lowest was fifty-nine above. The lowest the previous night was fifty-six above. At nine a.m. it was sixty-three above and at nine p.m. fifty-nine above.

The tide will be high this afternoon at 1.08 and tomorrow at 1.51; it will be high tomorrow morning at 2.14 and Thursday at 2.41.

The sun sets this evening at 7.42 and tomorrow at 7.41; it rises tomorrow morning at 4.32 and Thursday at 4.33.

The moon rises tonight at 9.48. The moon was full Friday, July 18, at 2.05 a.m.

The first quarter of the moon will be on Saturday, July 26th, at 5.59 a.m. The length of to-day will be fifteen hours and twelve minutes.

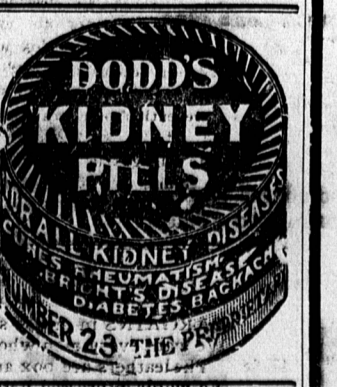
