—The Upper House heard a strong protest by Senator J.W. de B. Farris (Lib., British Columbia) against an article appearing in the current issue of Time United States weekly news magazine.

The article, which the British Columbia senator said was in violation of the 23rd Psalm and the refusal suggestions he should read it into the record, it was "cheap, poor taste and an insult to intelligent readers."

A section read by Senator Farris referred to the conscription debate in the House of Commons and said none of the 128 speakers referred to reports that 500 Quebec municipalities had signed pledges against acceptance under any condition of conscription for overseas service.

Not only was the statement untrue he proceeded, but it was "obviously intended to intensify the belief in the United States that there is something wrong with Canada's war effort."

The magazine had for some time been unfair and inaccurate in its reports of Canadian news and printed reports "designed to give a false impression and bring discredit on the government."

The Government's Land Settlement Bill was explained by Senator Leader King who said it was expected to provide assistance for a large number of members of the forces.

Senator Ballantyne, who sits for Quebec, urged that as many men as possible should be settled in Eastern Canada. Unless great care was taken in selecting the men and they were allowed more than \$1,200 for equipment the government would experience trouble similar to that following the land settlement scheme of the First Great War, he said.

Senator Lambert contended that under depressed post-war conditions it was quite possible that a great many people would be willing to engage in farm work on a subsistence basis. In presenting the legislation the government was conscientiously attempting to lay the foundation for a reconstruction five years ago.

—The National Unity Mr. King had sought to preserve had been proven illusory and party unity was shattered. The Prime Minister sought to restore that unity by temporizing.

—More Shelving, Delay
The Prime Minister's last statement on July 7 meant there would be conscription "if, as and when" and Parliament being asked to give a vote of confidence meant more delay and more shelving of responsibility on a vital issue, "by a government which has in the past two years usurped more power and assumed more arbitrary control of our lives and property than any government in all our history," Mr. Hanson said.

He wondered how the defence ministers could accept this intent to delay the land settlement. The vote of confidence meant another unnecessary pledge which lied program.

"The Corsican Brothers" At The Capitol Theatre

There has been an excellent bill of fare at the Capitol Theatre this week and "The Corsican Brothers" which opened last evening delighted a full house. Edward Small's pictureization of the Alexander Dumas novel was superb. Swift action, thrilling drama, and all the romance of the Dumas novel are here, expertly directed by Gregory Ratoff. That the audience recognize "The Corsican Brothers" as top-notch entertainment, was evidenced by the enthusiastic reception that was given the film.

Swashbuckling Hero

In the dual role of the twin brothers, who seek revenge for the wrongs done their family by the Corsican tyrant, one hundred years ago, Douglas Fairbanks, Jr., gives an exciting performance. He has no easy job, creating two separate characters who are different, yet alike in most respects. One, brought up in luxury, is a gay young man of the world. The other, raised as a bandit in the wilds of Corsica, is a dour and forbidding personality. Yet young Douglas Fairbanks manages to convey their likenesses as well as their differences, with an authenticity that is astounding.

Swift Action Scenes

In the scenes of action, the hard riding, the duels and the fighting scenes, he is particularly good. Thrilling sword-play, vivid and exciting, carry the story along to a really great climax.

Special words of praise are due for the villains of the film, Akim Tamiroff, as the tyrant, and John Emery, as his lieutenant, are the very embodiment of evil.

Superb Supporting Cast

Ruth Warrick, in the feminine lead, is comparatively a newcomer to motion pictures; but in this film, she gives ample evidence of her ability. She is a lovely creature, and she can act.

Senators Farris of B. C. Protests Article Appearing in Time Magazine.

OTTAWA, July 21 (CP)—Land settlement plans for veterans of the present war should be regarded as part of a general program to meet post-war problems, two members of the Senate said today in a debate on the Land Settlement Bill.

The bill was given second reading and referred to the banking and commerce committee which will consider it tomorrow.

Senator Norman Lambert (Lib. Ontario) and Senator N. M. Paterson (Lib. Ontario) supported the bill in emphasizing the necessity for post-war planning. General principles of the bill were endorsed by Senator E.B. Horner (Con. Saskatchewan) but he considered the allowance for purchase of implements too low.

Senator John Hall (Con. Manitoba) opposed the bill and predicted the plan would fail. Senator C.C. Ballantyne, Conservative Senator

Fear Pilot Is Drowned

HALIFAX, July 22 (CP)—The Royal Canadian Air Force announced today that Pilot Lt. C.F. Turner of Toronto is presumed to have drowned after his single-engine aircraft crashed at sea earlier in the day.

A statement issued from the Eastern Passage base of the R.C.A.F. said:—

"A flying accident occurred off the east coast of Nova Scotia at approximately 7:30 a.m. July 22, 1942. The aircraft, a single-engine type, crashed into the sea and disappeared immediately. The pilot, Lt. C.F. Turner, who was doing a routine patrol, is presumed to have drowned. Neither the plane nor the body have been recovered. The next of kin is his father who lives at 746 St. Clair Ave., West Toronto."

Axis Claim Oil From Rubber Now

NEW YORK, July 22 (AP)—The Axis claimed today that, reversing the rubber-from-petroleum experiments of the United Nations, the Japanese have succeeded in producing motor fuel from rubber.

The Axis lacks oil, as the United Nations lack rubber. The new development was reported by the Berlin radio in a dispatch dated September 1, the new Japanese name for Singapore, which lies at the tip of the rubber-producing Malay Peninsula.

In New York, authoritative sources expressed skepticism. The synthetic rubber expert on one American oil company commented:—

"It's possible, but highly improbable, that the Japs can get a synthetic gasoline from rubber. If they have such a process—and I doubt it—it's bound to be uneconomical."

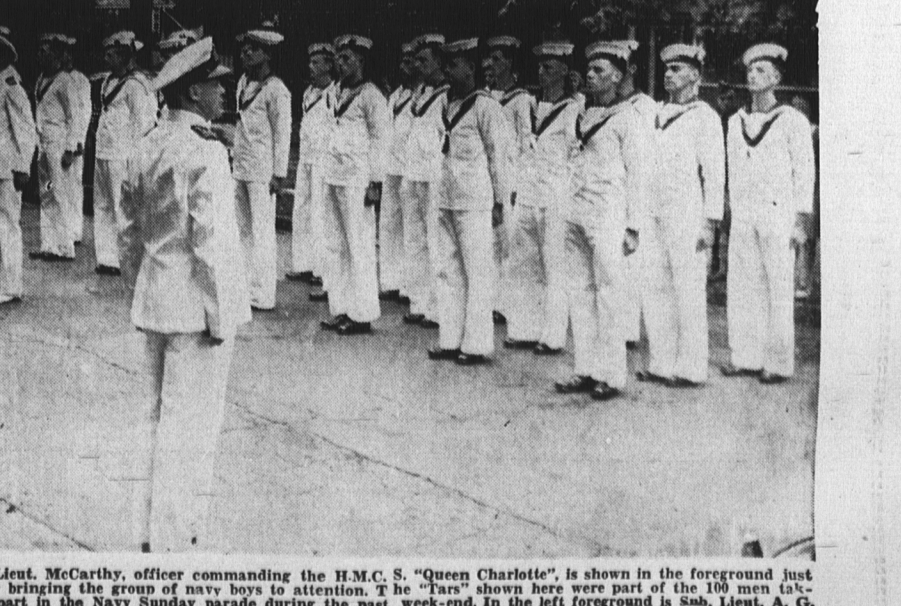
