

ACROSS CANADA

BY ALL EXPENSE TOUR.

The suggestion of a trip across Canada seems at first glance an expensive undertaking to the average person, when he or she stops to consider the distance covered and the cost of rail fare, hotels and incidental expenses. Yet it is not necessarily all as expensively expensive as it is often made out to be.

This year the Adam's Tour will undertake its fourth and the Kerr Bryson its fifth annual All Expense Tour.

The Adam's tour will leave Montreal Thursday, July 11th, for the Pacific Coast, visiting enroute Toronto, Minnaki, Winnipeg, Saskatoon, Calgary, Banff, Lake Louise, Edmonton, and through the Canadian Rockies to Prince Rupert and the Pacific Coast, where a palatial Canadian National Steamship will be boarded for a trip through sheltered scenic seas to Vancouver. The Kerr-Bryson tour commences at Toronto Wednesday, July 24th, and includes a trip to Victoria B. C., leaving there August 8th, on the return journey. The tour ends at Toronto August 14th.

FARM LAND VALUES

Q. What are the present farm land values in Canada? A. The average value of the occupied farm lands of Canada as a whole, including both improved and unimproved land, as well as dwelling houses, barns, stables and other farm buildings is returned as \$38 per acre. By provinces the averages are as follows, with the previous year's values given within brackets; Prince Edward Island, \$44 (\$41); Nova Scotia \$34 (\$37); New Brunswick \$31 (\$30); Quebec (\$57); Ontario \$62 (\$65); Manitoba \$27 (\$27); Saskatchewan \$27 (\$26); Alberta, \$28 (\$28); British Columbia, \$90 (\$89).

In Sympathy With Teachers

At a meeting of the Labourers Protective Union the following resolutions re the present situation regarding "increased salaries for teachers," was unanimously adopted.

Whereas "On account of our teachers requesting the government to increase their salaries and were refused; and whereas they have decided to stop teaching until the matter is adjusted; and whereas "The children attending those school are helpless in settling this grievance."

Therefore resolved that we the Labourer's Protective Union place ourselves on record as being in sympathy with the teachers; and further resolved "That we are of the opinion that every member of the Legislative Assembly should co-operate and pass such legislation as will enable our teachers to continue their good work in connection with our educational department.

Summer Tour To The Maritimes

The tourist attractions of the Maritime Provinces are receiving a great deal of publicity through a series of articles which are appearing in the New Outlook, the organ of the United Church, published in Toronto, in connection with the New Outlook Maritime tour this coming summer. These articles are written, evidently, by some one well versed with the Maritime Provinces, and give a pen picture of their scenic beauties and other points of appeal to tourists.

There would appear to be an awakening of interest on the part of the people of Ontario in the Maritime Provinces as is evidenced by the greater number who visited them last year, and this tour is a direct result of that awakened interest.

The New Outlook Maritime tour will leave Toronto, Monday, June 1st and will travel via the Canadian National Railways from there to Ottawa, Montreal, Quebec, the Saguenay River, crossing over the Saguenay, to the south side of the St. Lawrence at Riviere du Loup, where they will again board the special Canadian National Train and proceed to Fredericton, from which point they will journey to Saint John, visiting St. Andrews-by-the-Sea. From St. Andrews they proceed to Moncton, Sackville, and to Cape Breton. Returning from Cape Breton they will visit New Glasgow, Pictou, Truro, Halifax, the South Shore of Nova Scotia to Yarmouth, Annapolis Royal, Grand Pre. From Grand Pre they will proceed direct to Prince Edward Island, and from there return to Toronto.
