# SOCIALISTS HAVE RIOT IN CHICAGO

### Refusing To Disperse on the Orders of The Police They Are Clubbed Right and Left, And Leader Placed Under Arrest

CHICAGO, Jan. 26.—An attempt of the socialists to bring about a "march of the unemployed," through the downtown streets today resulted in two sharp fights in which the would-be marchers were routed after a number of men had been clubbed. Dr. Benjamin L. Reitman, the author of the plan to march, and two of his followers were arrested. For several days, Reitman, who is a socialist, had been making announcements about his intention to hold a parade of hoboes and unemployed. Despite a warning by the chief of police that no march through the streets would be permitted, Reitman continued, however, to defy the authorities and last night a number of "irregulars" were distributed through the downtown saloons and in the boarding house district, calling upon all men out of work to assemble at two o'clock on the Lake front. At a few minutes before 2 o'clock a crowd commenced to gather on Michigan

Avenue in front of the Art Institution, and in a few minutes a column which was really a series of bunches of four and five was formed, and headed by Reitman, they started west of Adams street. The marchers proper did not number more than 200 at any time, but many hundred of people formed with them alongside the walk and added to the confusion. After marching his followers on Adams street, Reitman counter-marched to Michigan Avenue and thence two blocks west on Madison street. Here he encountered a squad of police under the command of Assistant Chief of Police Stuetzler, who after a command to disband had been disregarded, ordered his men to charge on the marchers. The police came as a run and the column was instantly broken up. Several men were knocked down and the police, not attempting to make any arrests, used their clubs on the fleeing unemployed. Followed closely by the officers, the marchers darted into the crowd of shoppers along State street, and several women were pushed to the sidewalk during the confusion.

## P. E. ISLAND S.S. CONVENTION

R Douglas Fraser, Editor Sunday School Publication Gives Impressions Of Boston Conference

A Sunday School worker in this Province has very recently received the following letter from Rev. R. Douglas Fraser of Toronto, editor of Sunday School Publication: "I have just returned from attending two conferences of International workers, the one in Boston, in regard to the Courses of Lessons, the other in Philadelphia, re Teacher Training Courses. One always comes away from Conferences of this sort more and more deeply impressed with the vastness of the Sunday-School cause and the ability and saneness of its international leaders. Hartshorn, Lawrence, and Pearce, not to mention others, are men you would think strong men in any company. I was very much struck also with the

influence which Dr. Rexford, our Canadian man, evidently has in the Lesson Committee." These conferences were of great value and should be deeply interesting to all religious workers in P. E. Island. Boston daily papers had such headings as the following: "The Lesson Conference," "where were assembled giant minds," "with a common purpose—a Christ Spirit." Besides many members of the International Association, among them Justice J. J. McLaren of Toronto, there were present editors and business managers of Sunday School publications in Canada and the United States representing 10,909,000 church members.

The final decisions, brought in by a strong committee, were as follows: (1) That the system of a general lesson for the whole school, which has been in successful use for thirty-five years is still the most practicable and effective system for the great majority of the Sunday-schools of North America. Because of its past accomplishments, its present usefulness, and its future possibilities we recommend its continuance and its fullest development. (2) That the need for a graded system of lessons is expressed by so many Sunday-schools and workers that it should be adequately met by the International Sunday-School Association, and that the Lesson Committee should be instructed by the next International Convention to continue the preparation of a thoroughly graded course covering the entire range of the Sunday-School.

## To The Electors of The City of Charlottetown.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:— Having been nominated at a meeting of Electors of Ward 5 and also requested by a number of voters not at that meeting to nominate for the Mayoralty I have decided to do so and will be a candidate for that office at the Civic election in February.

I had the honor of a seat at the Council Board for several years as the representative of Wards 3 and 4 and later on the Board of Sewer and Water Commissioners as Chairman. I feel that my record in these two bodies justify me in soliciting your support for the Mayor's chair.

I am in favor of a certain amount of civic improvements being made each year commensurate with our revenue, but I opposed to any large increase in the bonded debt of the City, more particularly the present time with such a straggle in the money market, it being almost impossible to sell Debentures except at a loss—City 3 per cent. Debentures being now offered at a fraction over eighty-three dollars per hundred.

I would recommend a change in our financial year. The year now closes Dec. 31. Under those conditions it is impossible to get the City accounts before the taxpayers in time to give them an intelligent idea of the City finances before nomination day.

Should you do me the honor of electing me to the important office of Mayor I will to the best of my ability endeavor to discharge the duties belonging to that office in the best interests of the City, as I have always heretofore done.
