### CABINET PREPARES PLANS FOR ROYAL TOUR \$400,000,000 Levy Is Imposed By Government

#### KING, QUEEN TO ARRIVE AT QUEBEC MAY 15

Will Be Absent From London About A Month On Canadian And U. S. Visit.

OTTAWA, Nov. 13 (CP)—King and Queen Elizabeth will arrive at Quebec City on the British Battleship Repulse May 15 and will remain in Halifax approximately five days. Prime Minister Mackenzie King announced today. The announcement was made simultaneously in Ottawa and London. Plans for the reception of their Majesties are being prepared and the Prime Minister himself is head of the cabinet committee of senior ministers who will have the final responsibility. All arrangements must be submitted to the Royal Family for approval but the entire responsibility for formulating them rests with the government. A second committee of deputy ministers will make the more detailed arrangements for the visit.

### Seven Dead In Rouyn Hotel Fire

ROUYN, Que., Nov. 13 (C. P.)—Toll of life in Saturday's early morning hotel fire was set at seven after a Toronto salesman had died today and officials had established the safety of two other persons feared trapped in the Albert's hotel when flames levelled the \$300,000 structure and a half-dozen other buildings. A. J. H. Stevenson of Toronto, terribly burned as he clung to an advertising sign after crawling from his third-floor window in the hotel, died more than 24 hours after the blaze had ravaged downtown Rouyn. Later a body identified as that of I. Legare, provincial mines department employee at Val d'Or, Que., was found in the wreckage, leaving five others listed as missing and almost certainly dead.

#### U. S. Clergy And Lay Leaders Denounce Reich

NEW YORK, Nov. 13 (AP)—Clergy and lay leaders in the United States using language of unsparring strength, today denounced the German subjugation of Jewish citizens. "Mad...inhuman...Bestial...Barbaric..." Those words were in sermons and other public utterances on the first Sunday since the newest Nazi oppressive movement, aftermath of a Jew's slaying of a Nazi diplomatic official. Some of the strongest sermons were delivered in the Protestant Church of England and Roman Catholic churches; and rabbis were unanimous, though tempered in at least one instance. Outlets, in the public, strong expressions came from the ranks of politics, labor and arts and many forms and classes of human endeavor. Secretary Cordell Hull called German Ambassador Hans Dieckhoff to the State Department Saturday for a 15-minute conversation, which gave rise to reports they had discussed the new measures against Jews in the Reich. However, neither the State Department nor the Ambassador would discuss the talk. It was explained that no formal protest by the United States was possible because the German decrees were of purely domestic concern.

#### Anti-Alcoholic Drive Called In Quebec

QUEBEC, Nov. 13 (CP)—An "anti-alcoholic crusade" in Quebec Province was called for today by its Roman Catholic bishops and a pastoral letter read from the pulpit in more than 1,400 parish churches. The province's civil authorities, its professional and business men and all its social classes were urged to join authorities of the Roman Catholic ecclesiastical province in stamping out "acoholism," denounced as a waster of individual worth and national prosperity. To support the proposed crusade, legislative action to restrict advertising of beer and alcoholic liquor and limit the issue of vending licenses in the province was suggested. The letter suggested to the campaign would benefit "in a less direct but very effective manner" if "material, social and spiritual" help to the masses were betted by civil undertaking.

QUEBEC, Nov. 13 (CP)—Hon. Louis Alfred Letourneau, member of the Quebec Legislative Council for La Salle since 1927, died in hospital today after an illness of five days. The 65-year-old legislator was taken suddenly ill last Wednesday.

#### Six Persons Drowned When Car Plunges Over Ferry Wharf

ROUYN, Que., Nov. 13 (CP)—Six persons drowned in the icy St. Lawrence River 10 miles from here tonight when their automobile plunged off the end of a ferry wharf and sank. Five of the victims consisted of a mother and her father and their three daughters. All six were Russians, returning to their homes at Val d'Or, 65 miles east of this northern Quebec gold-mining centre, after a Sunday visit here. The dead: Paul Yemchuk, 60, Mr. and Mrs. A. #### NEW TREATMENT IMPERILS PACT WITH BRITAIN

LONDON, Nov. 13 (CP)—Britons of government ranks and the opposition joined churchmen and newspapers during the weekend in declaring anti-semitic violence in Germany threatened European peace. Amid widespread condemnation of the Nazi campaign came evidence from a cabinet minister that it had shaken the faith of at least one of Prime Minister Chamberlain's colleagues in his efforts to obtain a lasting friendship with Chancellor Hitler.

#### Opinion United Against Anti-Semitic Violence Threat To Peace Seen.

Addressing a regional meeting of the National Labor Council on Saturday, Earl De La Warr, President of the Board of Education, said that encouraging hopes for appeasement, "events on the continent during the last few days have served to add certainty to the conviction that we live in a world in which those who desire to defend the agencies of life must be strong both in arms and in moral purpose."

#### Labor Leader Protests

Arthur Greenwood, Labor, who was singled out for attack last Sunday by Hitler because he had asserted he wished to see the end of all dictatorships, spoke out against "pogroms and persecutions." Addressing a meeting at Doncaster, the Labor front bench said Mr. Chamberlain's peace policy must be "dismal failure so long as the international atmosphere is poisoned by clouds of vilification, abuse and misrepresentation; nor will the atmosphere be sweetened by repeated pogroms and persecutions."

#### Mother Cabrini Is Beatified

VATICAN CITY, Nov. 13 (AP)—Mother Francesca Saverio Cabrini, the first United States citizen numbered by the Roman Catholic Church among its blessed in heaven. Mother Cabrini, who devoted her life to Italian immigrants and became a naturalized American, was beatified in moving ceremonies in St. Peter's Cathedral. George Cardinal Mundelein, Archbishop of Chicago, who celebrated her beatification Mass, paid Mother Cabrini tribute in the first broadcast delivered by an American priest. While Pope Pius XI was officiating at the altar after an accumulation of wax caught fire in the base of the wooden chandeliers and ho the candles around a bronze altar canopy. Vatican firemen were called but they decided the flames were dangerous. After the Pope had departed and one of them climbed a ladder and extinguished the blaze with a bucket of water. Few of the audience were aware of the mishap.

#### Plane Plunges Into River, Two Killed

DETROIT, Nov. 13 (AP)—Two men were killed today when their sign-towing airplane lost a wing and plunged into the Detroit River 15 miles south of here. The body of James Burns of Detroit, the pilot, was recovered by coast guardsmen. A second body still being made for the body of Roy Lowry, also of Detroit, his companion.

#### France Embarks On Recovery Program

PARIS, Nov. 13 (CP)—France embarked today on a vigorous three-year recovery program launched by 32 Government decrees, which revalued the Bank of France's gold stock, modified the 40-hour week and otherwise were directed at increasing credits to spur production. Promulgated under powers given Premier Edouard Daladier's Government by Parliament until Nov. 15, the measures fell under three main headings—economic, financial and administrative.

OTTAWA, Nov. 13 (CP)—Hon. Dr. R. J. Manion will tomorrow undergo his first test at the polls since he was chosen last July to succeed Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett as leader of the National Conservative Party. At the by-election in London, one of three being decided tomorrow, Dr. Manion faces E. O. Hall, candidate of the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation, in a riding that has elected 16 Conservatives since Confederation and has been continuously Conservative since 1917. Other contests are in Waterloo South and Brandon, both Conservative in the last elections and, as was the case in London, made vacant by the deaths of sitting members.

#### Levy Is Imposed By Government

BERLIN, Nov. 13 (A. P.)—Fearing ruin, 160 leaders of the Berlin Jewish community met until dawn today in a frantic effort to devise a plan for payment of the \$100,000,000 fine the Government imposed on Germany's Jews for the slaying of a German diplomat in Paris. A spokesman for the group said they wanted to suggest a plan of their own before the Government decided how the levy is to be paid. Jews expected the Finance Ministry, which is charged with exacting the penalty decreed yesterday, would announce its plan for collection some time this week.

#### Urges U. S. Repair Munition Shortages

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13 (AP)—General Main Craig, United States Chief of Staff, urged today as "a matter of major military importance" that the Army's war reserves of munitions be put up as soon as possible. To remedy "marked shortages" in reserves and in modern weapons for the regular army, General Craig in his annual report made recommendations for more men, guns and ammunition. These recommendations are expected generally to be reflected in President Roosevelt's forthcoming rearmament proposals to the new congress. Reserves are far short of requirements the General reported to War Secretary Woodring, both for an initial protective force of 400,000 and the army of 1,000,000 men which under General Staff plans would be formed in the first four months of a war. In men, the army's top ranking officer proposed that the regular army be increased now by \$300 to 168,000.

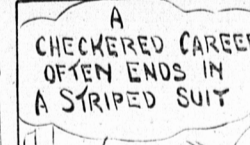

While police watched, a youth not in uniform climbed the pedestal of the historic column "Mariensäule," erected in the square in honor of the Virgin Mary, and systematically tore down the remaining decorations. Indignant shouts went up from onlookers but police did not interfere and departed after he had finished his job. Catholics had assembled in the square for the tercentenary celebration of erection of the column. The first part of the observance, a special service at Saint Peter's Cathedral was without incident. Michael Cardinal Von Faulhaber did not officiate. It was understood he was avoiding public appearances in view of Saturday's window-smashing at his place when an excited crowd threw stones. When the churchgoers joined the crowd in the square the disturbance followed. Saturday's attack followed an address by Adolf Wagner, Bavarian Nazi leader, who denounced "Roman Catholic allies of Jews."
