REICHSTAG SNUBBED BY PAPAN CABINET

Declined To Attend Meetings Of The Two Standing Committees.

BERLIN, Sept. 13. — (A.P.) — Chancellor Franz Von Papen and his Cabinet snubbed the Reichstag today by declining to attend meetings of the two standing committees. Meanwhile every indication was that the Government's opposition would bow to the Cabinet's contention that a decree of dissolution read in the Reichstag at yesterday's exciting session after non-confidence in the government had been overwhelmingly voted was legally correct and effective.

Apparently the opposition had abandoned its intention of appealing to the Supreme Court on the theory that dissolution was promulgated after the Cabinet had been defeated and therefore the Reichstag still was legally in session as it could not be dissolved by repudiated Ministers.

AMERICAN NURSE MAKING GOOD HEADWAY

Ulbrich Trans-Atlantic Plane Took Off From New York Yesterday On Ocean Hop.

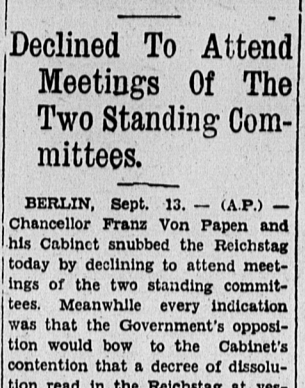
NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—(A.P.)—The aeroplane "American Nurse" was headed east today in a nonstop flight which its three occupants hoped would end in Rome.

At 8:55 a. m. a big plane believed to be the "American Nurse" was sighted as it passed out to sea near Provincetown, Mass. Four hours later the S. S. Dartford reported sighting the plane more than 400 miles east of Boston flying very low in clear weather. From Cape Cod, Ulbrich planned to fly 1000 miles east along the 42nd parallel and then veer slightly south so as to strike the Spanish coast.

Gov't. Has Not Decided On Amount Of Loan

OTTAWA, Sept. 13.—The Dominion Government has not decided on the amount of any loan which it may float this fall or the interest rate. But so far as the interest is concerned the desire of the Government is to secure its loans at as low a rate as possible. This intention was made in high official sources today on the protest of the Lumbermen's Bureau of Toronto against a reported proposal that the Government would shortly issue a loan "at a rate of interest

HUTCHINSON PLANE FORCED DOWN BY SLEET

Flying Family And Crew Picked Up By Trawler "Lord Talbot," On Treacherous Reef — Plane Total Wreck.

ANGMAGSALIK, Greenland, Sept. 13.—(A.P.)—After a two-day search along the east Greenland coast by aviators and seamen the Hutchinson "Flying Family" was found today on a beach less than 40 miles from here. They had cracked up their trans Atlantic plane in a treacherous reef-filled ford.

The party of eight, including George R. Hutchinson, his wife and two little daughters were picked up by the British trawler "Lord Talbot" which had been scouting around a position given by the Hutchinsons in an S. O. S. call since Sunday afternoon.

Governor Knud Oldendow, of Greenland advised the Danish Government at Copenhagen tonight that the Lord Talbot had arrived at Angmagsalik late today with the Hutchinson party. He added Hutchinson said his plane was forced down by sleet and smashed on a reef by the waves.

While the Government has made no decision on the subject of a loan present indications in official quarters do not support the information on which the protest was based.

The situation remains as it did ten days ago. The residuum amounting to \$34,000,000 of a war loan falls due on Nov. 1. The possibility is that the government may float a loan of \$50,000,000 to take care of this maturity with interest on the new issue at 4 1-2 per cent. The loan would very likely be a domestic one payable in Canadian funds. On December 1 a \$40,000,000 maturity is payable in New York. These treasury notes are now bearing interest at 4 percent. Possibly this loan may be re-converted at the same interest rate.

Japanese Beetle On Way

FREDERICTON, N. B., Sept. 13.—The Japanese beetle, dread ravager of gardens, is continuing its march through the United States toward the New Brunswick Maine border, and Dominion entomological officials here are apprehensive over its appearance in New Brunswick. So far the voracious pest has not been reported seen in Canada, but the fact that it has already put in an appearance in the vicinity of Bangor, Maine, has given rise to the fear that sooner or later it will have to be coped with on the Canadian side of the boundary.

LONDON NOT IN ACCORD WITH FRANCE

LONDON, Sept. 13.—The foreign office has taken marked pains to let the world know that Britain is not committed by the terms of the French reply to Germany on disarmament.

Germany argues that if other signatories of the Versailles Treaty do not carry out the pledge to disarm, Germany has a right to re-arm. Britain will be glad enough if the German arguments help to induce France to take a more progressive line at the Geneva disarmament conference.

At the same time there is an appreciation of the force of the French contention that Germany has not kept the Versailles Treaty in spirit. She has two or three private and illegal armies in existence and she has suspended democratic government and established a military government of the old militarist elements that world opinion holds responsible for the great war.

It is also noted that those sections of the German people who are opposed to re-armament are not allowed liberty of expression by the present German government.

A Berlin newspaper was immediately suppressed for printing an article yesterday which said nothing worse than that the German government, which has cut wages and unemployment relief to starvation levels, is anxious to spend money on tanks, submarines and military aeroplanes.

MOMENTOUS SESSION FOR EMPIRE TRADE

Parliamentary Ratification Of Empire Trade Pacts Prime Reason For Early Sitting, Which Will Form Part Of Regular Session.

OTTAWA, Sept. 13. — Canada's Parliament convening on October 6 will make new history. It will write on the statute books of this country in the view of many approval of the greatest advancement down through the centuries of time of trade within the British Empire. Not since the early days of the Great War is the Empire atmosphere so bound to predominate.

The session will be a regular meeting of Parliament.

In announcing the opening date of Parliament today, Prime Minister R. B. Bennett made this fact distinctly clear. The Governor General is curtailing his tour of Western Canada and will be back in Ottawa in time to open Parliament. The Speech From the Throne will have the usual precedence. But the general disposition will be to shorten debate on the Address in Reply and get down to discussion of the Imperial Conference agreements.

Canada has made trade agreements with the United States and the British Commonwealth.

The Can. Chamber Of Commerce In Annual Session

Conviction Voiced At Yesterday's Meeting That Canada Is On The Threshold Of The Upswing.

HALIFAX, Sept. 13.—A mood of restrained optimism as regards the future of Canadian and international business, and a concerted demand for reductions in the cost of government were crystallized in today's opening session of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce in annual convention. Canadian business men heard Col. W. L. McGregor, President of the Chamber, voice the conviction that Canada "is on the threshold of the upswing," but

warned against too great ebullience, and declared that "there are enormous readjustments to be made the world over in government finances."

They heard A. O. Dawson, chairman of the executive, express the view that the Dominion's present need was a reduction in taxation.

In the afternoon they joined to discuss facts and figures bearing on the costs of government. "The

Back - To - Land Employment Plan Must Speeded Up By Hoover

(Special to the Guardian)

TORONTO, Sept. 13.—Nearly 400 families, representing nearly 2,000 people, have been taken under the land settlement scheme from the urban localities and put on the land where they will have an opportunity to be self-supporting.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—President Hoover acted today to speed up the \$200,000,000 federal construction program with the hope of bringing employment to thousands this winter.

He called for the department heads to submit estimates of building projects in their departments. Based on treasury department estimates, the expenditure of \$200,000,000 should provide work for about 500,000 men.

Mr. Hoover said Secretary of the Treasury Ogden Mills had advised him money now was available for the construction program.

It is the hope of the administration that the placing to work of 500,000 men will change the benefits down to others because of increased purchasing power. It is felt such a dent in the ranks of the unemployed might serve to start a stream of money down through the intricate social fabric.

It was "resolution day" before adjournment this evening, dozens of measures and proposals had been adopted by the convention. Seeking extension of moratorium acts in all provinces where such was now law, and urging legislatures who have not already done so to pass such legislation, another resolution adopted after considerable discussion said industrial conditions "have not improved and workers find themselves in the same or worse position in regard to mortgages on their property."

Trades And Labor In Convention

HAMILTON, Sept. 13.—"Six hour day, five day week," the oft-repeated cry of labor again resounded today as the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, in convention here, reiterated its stand and passed a resolution which placed it on record as in favor of the "adoption of the six hour work day and five day week by all public authorities in order to increase the opportunity for employment." This course, if adopted ultimately by governments, manufacturers and industry generally, would lead to tremendous increases in employment, the delegates believed, and there was not a dissenting voice as President Tom Moore of Ottawa, placed the resolution before the Congress.

Fill Dead Teeth By New Method

BUFFALO, N. Y., Sept. 13.—A new method to restore dead teeth by means of a germ-killing filling was explained today at the 19th annual meeting of the American Academy of Periodontology.

The methods, the result of years of dental research by University of Toronto scientists, was brought before the academy by Dr. Andrew J. McDough. Explaining that people generally feared having dead teeth filled, Dr. McDough declared they had developed a copper amalgam filling which would counteract any possible ill effects.

"First it was discovered that copper amalgam has a potent bactericidal effect and kills germs within a radius of three-quarters of an inch," he said. "Pioneer work by Dr. Frederick C. Hunt led to the development of copper amalgam fillings, which now are coming into use for the treatment of cavities in dead teeth."
