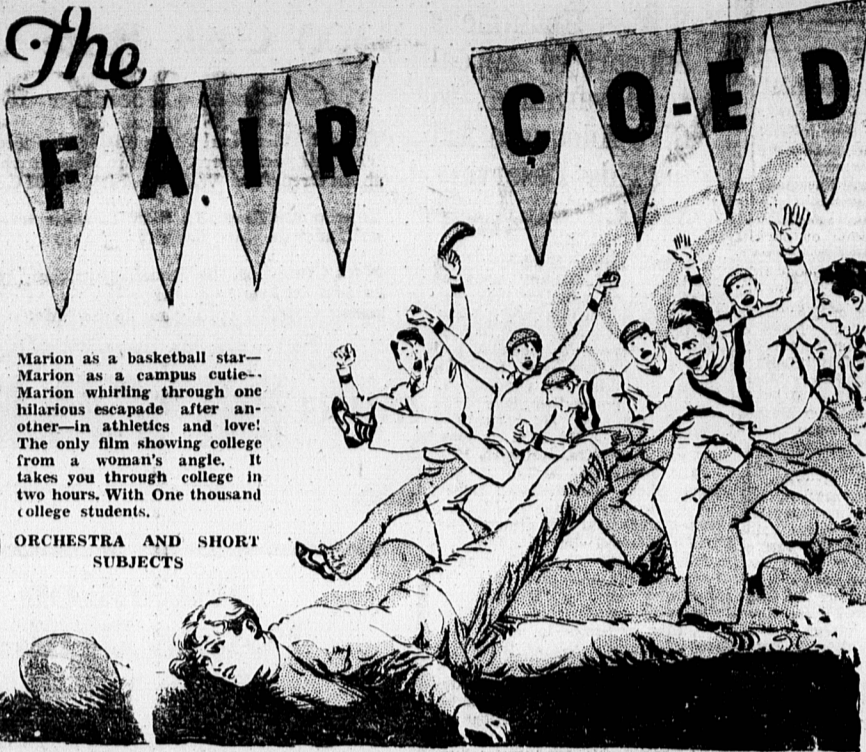

BOSTON CANADIAN CLUB TO ENTERTAIN THEIR EXCELLENCIES

The Canadian Club of Boston of which a Charlottetonian is President are Planning to Entertain Their Excellencies. The Great Canadian Population in New England Equals Population Of Montreal.

When His Excellency, the Governor-General of Canada, Viscount Willingdon, accompanied by Viscountess Willingdon, ascends the imposing steps of the Massachusetts state capital in Boston on the afternoon of Dec. 12 to pay a courtesy call on His Excellency, the Honorable Alvin T. Fuller, Governor of Massachusetts, he will have set a precedent in the annals of Canadian-American relations, for so far as is known, no Governor-General of Canada has ever before visited Boston during his term of office.

that New England, especially Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Connecticut, is, and always has been, the most highly industrialized section of the United States. The fact that ready employment was to be had, alone, probably was what brought the first immigrants to this section from the Provinces.

It is a serious problem, this emigration of Canadians in such large numbers to the United States and a problem to which leaders in Canada have given much thought in recent years. One often hears a Canadian say, "Yes, I'd like to return to Canada, but how can I? I can't make as much money there, there isn't the same chance for advancement and there aren't the same advantages in any way in Canada as there are in this country."

Undoubtedly the chief reason that so many Canadians from the Provinces are found in this area is that New England, especially Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Connecticut, is, and always has been, the most highly industrialized section of the United States.
