Rise And Fall Of Tides

(Continued from Page 4)

Region that can be referred to Portage Island is limited to Miramichi Bay itself. The tidal difference based on St. Paul Island must be subtracted from the next following tide there; for otherwise the differences vary so widely as to be practically valueless for finding the time of the tide. Low water at Richibucto and high water at Shediac cannot be preferred with advantage to any port of reference; but these tides are frequently flat and uncertain in time, as already explained. At Shediac and as far as Buctouche, the lower low water can be referred to Charlottetown in continuance of Northumberland Strait.

In regard to the range of the tide, it is to be noted that in some months, the inequality will occur at the spring tides, and in other months at the neaps, according to the moon's position. It is also reversed, as between the day and nights tides, at the opposite seasons of the year. At Charlottetown, the inequality between the two tides of the day may be greater than the true difference between springs and neaps.

DIED IN WINNIPEG

The death occurred in Vancouver, B. C., on November 28th of Dr. William M. Deinstadt, aged 82 of St. Stephen, N. B. He was buried there last week. Dr. Deinstadt was a native of Nova Scotia. He attended Harvard Medical School and was one of its oldest graduates. In 1876 he came to St. Stephen from Prince Edward Island. His wife, formerly Mrs. Graham, of Saint John died about 10 years ago. There were four children, only one of whom, Mrs. Killiam, of Vancouver, is living. Besides this daughter, he is survived by one sister, Mrs. Morrison, in Prince Edward Island, who lived with him here in recent years, until his departure for Vancouver. There are two nieces, one residing in Halifax and the other in Montreal. When due to advanced years Dr. Deinstadt was forced to give up his practice here last summer, he went to live with his daughter in Vancouver.

AT ROTARY

At the Rotary luncheon yesterday the speaker was Rotarian Neil MacLean, who gave an interesting address on Ancient and Modern Embalming. He explained the methods as carried on by the ancient Egyptians and stated that with the discovery of the arterial system modern arterial embalming began. Today the embalmer restores the bloom of youth that has faded in illness, he is able to rebuild wasted tissues, remove lines of suffering, wrinkles of age, make the skin soft and velvety and to restore the colors and tints of youth. He also spoke of the varied knowledge which an embalmer must possess. He must know anatomy, bacteriology, physiology, hygiene, chemistry, pathology, disinfecting and antiseptics, transportation rules, post mortem work and post mortem conditions. He must also be a cosmetician and a casket trimmer. He must know the professional and business law, be well versed in funeral management and funeral directing and also be a salesman, purchasing agent, collector, bookkeeper, letter writer, advertising specialist, accountant, and financier. Rotarian James Leightner was in the chair. The President, James A. MacMillan, read a communication from one of the International officers complimenting the secretary of the Charlottetown Club, Percy Turner, on his admirable notices he sends out every week.
