The winter just passed was the severest ever known in the mining section of Missouri, and nearly all the mills in the district were closed down entirely or ran very irregularly, thus materially curtailing production. This Province is not the only place that suffered this winter.

Rev. Thomas Pierce of Shediac will probably succeed Rev. Dr. Wilson in Zion church. He has accepted a call from that congregation. Rev. Mr. Pierce has occupied pulpits at Courtenay Bay, Newcasale, Bocabec, Keswick, Hillsboro, Apohaqui, Nashwaak, and Shediac.—St. John Sun.

Principal Falconer was likewise visited, and as a result, has suffered with a severe throat trouble. We are glad to be able to report that both have sufficiently recovered to again meet their classes. Dr. Magill has not been forgotten, but is now convalescent. Strange, it may seem, yet we are forced to admit, that even the theological professors are not secure from the foes of frail humanity." Halifax Herald.

VANCOUVER World: A large number of natives of the Maritime Provinces, now resident in British Columbia, will make a journey to their old home during the coming summer. At the annual meeting of the association held in the O'Brien hall Tuesday night the committee on railway excursion reported that letters had been received from about one hundred members who will go east this year if excursion rates are obtained, and that the railway companies have been asked to grant return tickets from points in British Columbia to points in the Maritime Provinces for single fare, to go about May 20 and June 20, good for three months.

The inland revenue department has been inspecting some flour samples and found no adulterations. A report just issued from the department, shows great adulteration in black and white pepper. In Nova Scotia seven samples were analyzed, and all genuine. In Prince Edward Island, two were analyzed, and both genuine. In New Brunswick seven were analyzed, three were genuine, one doubtful and three adulterated. In Quebec, three were genuine, one doubtful, and 18 adulterated. In Manitoba, 27 were genuine, one doubtful, and 5 adulterated, and in British Columbia 3 were genuine, 1 doubtful, and 4 adulterated. There were 80 samples in all. The adulteration of black pepper is greater than white pepper. Out of 90 samples of black pepper, 31 were adulterated, 7 doubtful, and 22 genuine. Of 25 samples of white pepper, 10 were adulterated, 13 genuine, and 3 doubtful.

The work of discharging cargo from the disabled steamer Paristan, commenced yesterday at No. 2 pier, Deep Water. Work was started at the after hatch and goods for Halifax, Charlottetown, Montreal and Toronto have been taken out. Among some of the goods discharged at the start were boxes of books for the British and American Book and Tract Society, and oil cloth for the Nova Scotia Furnishing Company. The goods are all water-soaked. Goods forward, of the engine room are expected to be found in good condition. The Paristan is taking in coal from a lighter alongside. This is being done to right the vessel and bring her on an even keel. When the cargo is discharged it is probable the break in the starboard side, caused by the collision, will be above the water line.—Halifax Herald 7th.

The local market, and in fact the whole county, is suffering from an over supply of potatoes, with the result that today the dealers are willing to sell at 40 cents per bushel, which means one dollar a barrel. A few fancy grades, of course, bring a slightly higher price, but the forty cent per bushel is the standard. The reason for this is that the potato crop last fall was very large all over. Arrostook farm, which usually ships thousands of car loads to Boston and New York, had thousands with a big surplus on hand that they do not know what to do with. Several local dealers are caught, as they bought heavy last fall expecting that the winter port boats would, as during the past few years, purchase their potatoes here, but instead of this being the case the steamers have had potatoes to sell, the crop on the other side of the water being sufficient for the demand. Usually at this time in the year there is a large shipment of potatoes from this port to Boston but as the price in Boston today is only 10 cents per bushel and there is a duty of 15 cents per bushel none are going forward.—St. John Sun.

SPEAKING of the action of the St. John Presbytery Tuesday Rev. Perry J. Stackhouse, of Tabernacle Baptist church, said last night he thought it was a mistake and there is a great deal to be said on the other side. "For instance," Mr. Stackhouse continued, "there are many men to whom the loss of a day's work is a serious matter and to these Sunday is the most convenient day. Of course there is no justification for people who can at all do otherwise holding funerals on that day. It does break up the preacher's work, especially if he conducts a Bible class in the afternoon. But then it does not happen very often. I myself have not had a Sunday funeral once in six months since entering on my charge." Speaking of his church on Haymarket Square, Mr. Stackhouse said that it was his ambition to have an institutional church, there with gymnasium and kindergarten attached. Of course this was impossible just now, but if the congregation had from \$10,000 to \$12,000 to purchase the house next to their present quarters the scheme could be put in operation.—St. John Telegraph.

ROBERT MITCHELL FLOYD, Editor of "Trade Press List", Boston, trade paper for trade paper men, writes The Guardian as below. All possible information has already been furnished. "Will you kindly oblige the writer by giving him some idea of the hotel and boarding-house accommodations of your town? It is quite probable that the writer, accompanied by his wife, will reach Charlottetown early in June, with the intention of making a three or four months' stay on the Island. Although familiar with almost every other part of the British possessions, Prince Edward Island has not yet formed part of my personal knowledge, and I do not want this summer to go by without being fully posted personally regarding Prince Edward Island and its people. So many delightful things have been said concerning the Island, that if half of them are true, it must be a delight both to the settler and the visitor to live there. If you have any descriptive matter concerning Charlottetown, I should be very glad indeed to have you send it with your answer." In another letter Mr. Floyd says:—"It is our wish to leave Boston for Prince Edward Island early in June, and to stay in your city either three or four months. This will give me an opportunity of becoming fully familiar with your island, and your friends, and of saying many kind words both in my own paper and through correspondence."
