It is the intention of the High Court of P. E. Island, of the Independent Order of Foresters, to hold their annual meeting in our City on Thursday and Friday next and to make this gathering a great Forester's demonstration. Special trains from all over the Island, low fares, and everything that can possibly be done, is to be carefully looked after, to make this gathering a notable one. On the Friday a procession of all the Courts on the Island will be held, starting from the Skating Rink on Fitzroy Street, at 1 o'clock, p. m., thence through the principal streets to Victoria Park, where speeches will be delivered by some of the most distinguished orators of Forestry.

YESTERDAY was a busy one at the police court. William McCabe, on the charge of drunkenness and disorderly conduct, was fined \$50 or 90 days. The prisoner was also fined \$2 or 10 days for annoying persons in their dwellings. The case of Chas. D. Collins for violation of the Prohibition Act was adjourned till Friday for judgement. The summons against John Carroll was dismissed owing to a lack of evidence. George offer for selling liquor between the 5th of June and the 30th July was fined \$100 and costs. Another conviction against Angus McDonald, and he was fined \$100 also. The case against Harry C. Connolly was adjourned till August 13th. John Hughes for a second infraction was again convicted and fined \$100 and costs. Mr. W. S. Stewart was counsel for Hughes, McDonald, Connolly and Offer, and Mr. J. J. Johnstone appeared for Collins.

THE regular monthly meeting of the School Board was held last evening. The following members were present: Mr. Blanchard, chairman, Mr. McLeod, Mr. Handrahan, Dr. Jenkins, Mr. Nash and Mr. Stewart. After disposing with correspondence relative to ventilation, etc., and reports of committees the question of enforcing the statute re vaccination was considered. On motion it was resolved that pursuant to the Provisions of the Act respecting vaccination of 1886. All pupils must produce satisfactory evidence of having been successfully vaccinated or of being insusceptible of the vaccine disease. Certificates of being too delicate to be vaccinated will not be accepted. Tenders for renovating blackboards were opened, the lowest tender being that of Mr. P. H. Trainor who was awarded the contract. Complaints have been received that pupils do not present themselves for enrollment on the first day of the reopening of the schools. Hereafter they will be required to register on the first otherwise they cannot attend without a special permit from the Board.

DEATH OF MRS. TREMAINE, Toronto Globe says:—The friends of Mrs. R. G. Tremaine in the Maritime Provinces and in Ontario will regret to hear of her death, which occurred on Sunday, July 21, at the residence of her brother, Dr. Oldright. Mrs. Tremaine had been slowly declining in health for a year past, but her courageous spirit supported the frail habitation so marvelously until, within a week or so of the end. She was the daughter of the late Major Oldright, of H. M. 81st regiment of foot and was born in Dublin. As a girl she lived in Gibraltar, the West Indies, and later in Halifax, where her married life was passed. After her father's death about eleven years ago, she removed to Toronto, where she has since for the most part resided. Mrs. Tremaine was a member of the Plymouth Brethren, and a devoted Christian. She was a woman of exceptional cultivation and social gifts. One son alone survives her; Mr. Cecil Tremaine, a graduate of the Toronto school of science, who is engaged in electrical engineering at Exeter, Ont. [Deceased was the widow of the late R. G. Tremaine, brother of Mrs. Justice Fitzgerald and Miss Bessie Tremaine of this city.]

EASTERN NOTES.—A few thunder showers recently have broken the spell, and the dry and parched earth and waning vegetation are improving, and assuming their usual conditions. While some parts of the Island had more or less rain, the showers appeared to avoid the hot, and comparatively narrow strip of land here, and seeks a resting place in the waters on each side of us. The results are to be seen in the shortened hay crop, and prospects of a greatly reduced straw crop. The hot and dry weather has been favorable to the potato bug, the supplies of Paris green are exhausted, no more to be bought and it looks at present as if some of our farmers would lose their entire crop.—Fishing is on the whole discouraging. There are some hake on the south side but virtually no bait and not likely to be any, unless a school of squid come this way, but this is not always a certainty. Along the north side, once the great home of the mackerel, where fish houses nestled in every sheltering cove, and boats were hauled up on every suitable beach, and thousands of dollars worth of mackerel were landed every summer, the fishing houses are going to decay, the boats are rotting on the beach, and the fishermen have to do without the dollars.—In waters where numerous schools of mackerel played, where hundreds of the white winged schooners of New England and the Provinces plied their work and made their living, now deep silence and blank desolation reign. This reason and that may be assigned for the change, but the blame must be laid at the door of the purse seine.—For the same cause, hake fishing is now doubtful for want of bait as they could always be relied on to supply bait for the trawls.—T. S. Robertson and Lauchlin McDonald make their fortnightly visits to the cheese board, and do their work satisfactorily.—Mrs. Whelan has arrived home after nearly a year's visit to her children about Roxbury, Mass. She is accompanied by her little grand-daughter.—Mrs. Johnson of Portland, Me., nee Miss Ellen Cameron, and Mrs. Wheelwright, nee Miss Kitty McKay, are spending the summer among their friends here. They have both been residents of the States for many years.—Mr. Gardiner preaches regularly and acceptably to large congregations every Sabbath.—A good many of our young men intend to go out on the harvest excursion to see the extent of our heritage and the immensity of our dominions in the North West, the home of millions yet to be, God-fearing loyal and true to the flag that braved a thousand years the battle and the breeze.
