## Hermit King's 2,000 Sheep and Goats

(By Dominion News Service) LONDON, Nov. 6.—With only goats and sheep as company, a lonely white man was found on a small island to the north of Australia by the destroyer Anzac which has just returned to Sydney from a northern cruise.

The hermit told the men on the Anzac that he had taken up his abode on the island some considerable time ago. He had no particular reason for leaving civilization.

His only companions when he went to the island were a couple of sheep and two goats. Today, he says, his flock consists of over 700 sheep and nearly twice that number of goats. He has built a comfortable home and has an extensive garden.

Once in a while a ship from the mainland visits his island and exchanges goods for his products.

The island is beautifully fertile and is about two miles in circumference according to the men on the Anzac, while the surrounding islands are barren and rocky.

For two days the Anzac stayed at this island and during that time the old hermit was the guest of the men of the destroyer.

The men on the Anzac would like to see the island again. They declare that the old hermit lives like a king.

## IN MEMORIAM

MR. MOORE SMITH

There passed away at his home at Victoria West on September 26th, 1923, Mr. Moore Smith in the 84th year of his age. Deceased was born at Georgetown, in 1840 and when a young man moved to Victoria West, he being one of the hardy pioneers of the district, as at that time it was all a wilderness there being no roads and the only way to travel was by water, but being very industrious and possessed of unusual health and strength, he tackled the forests, cleared the land, hewed the lumber and built a comfortable log cabin and other building at the shore. Then later when the road was put through the other end of the farm he moved up to the main road and erected the present comfortable buildings. His home was always open to his neighbors and strangers, and he was a hearty welcome. He was a man of sterling character, and was always interested in everything that would tend to benefit the community and for years he assisted in holding prayer meetings at Emore and Victoria West, he was also a consistent member of the Methodist Church for the last 45 years. Being of a kind and jovial disposition he was loved and respected by all who knew him, and it can truthfully be said he lived and died without an enemy, and there are many besides his family and relatives that will mourn the loss of a good neighbor and a true friend. In 1881 he married Miss Lenora Connell of Wellington who still survives him. Up till August 3rd. he was in his usual health and able to work when he was suddenly stricken with a severe attack of heart trouble and despite all that medical skill and loving care could do he passed to that Great Beyond to be with Him who said: "Come unto Me all ye that labor and are heavy laden and I will give you rest." Beside a sorrowing widow he leaves to mourn the loss of a kind and loving father, three sons and three daughters namely Wm. A. Smith of Victoria West, John Wesley on the homestead Ray of Sanford Maine, Mrs. John E. Moore and Mrs. Martin Ladner of Sandford Maine, and Mrs. Daniel McLeod of Victoria West, all being home at the time of his death. The funeral which was unusually large was conducted by Rev. Mr. Brown at the Methodist Church, Victoria West, the pall bearers were Messrs. Wesley Moore, Albert Moore, Herbert Reeves, George Bellam, John Egan and Alex. Nisbet.

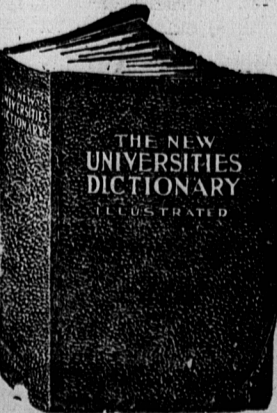
