ONE BANISHED VICE.

People who think that human nature doesn't change can find proof of at least one alteration, which is also an improvement in the fact that misers of the sort apparently familiar to the writers of all other days than these are no longer to be found in any part of the world.

Men, and women, too, who loved actual cash, especially gold, for its own sake and quite apart from its purchasing power, must have been rather numerous up to a generation or two ago, for they have a considerable place in all histories of the intimate sort, and, obviously, drawn more or less closely after nature, they abound in the works of old novelists. Of course there are still meanly penurious people—people whose standard of living is somewhat or ever far lower than their incomes or resources would warrant. In the milder cases this seems to be only a survival of saving habits that were commendable enough when required and were continued through a morbid realization of life's uncertainties and an exaggerated fear of coming to want at last, but nowadays, whenever failure to spend is carried to any length, as it so often was in other times, the symptoms are almost always those of outright insanity and the hoarding seems to be done accidentally and out of indifference to money rather than any joy in its mere possession. The old fellows who created the miser type that novelists and dramatists found so useful were not made, else they would have been objects of sympathy, not detestation of laughter, as they had to be to serve the intended purpose.

In some ways Miss Jane Perkins Williams illustrated the peculiarities of the old-fashioned misers. She lived much as they did, so far as the conduct of her house was concerned—that is, she spent little for food and nothing for brooms, but it was not from a desire that her capital might be decreased, or that a greater portion of her income might be added to it. This is shown by the finding in her wretched home scores of unopened envelopes containing cheques, many of them years old. From them she had none of the real miser's satisfaction. In short, she seemed to have no special living for money, and her failure to spend it for the comforts and felicities of life was purely incidental to the mental disturbances of which she was the victim. Her treasury of every newspaper that contained the reference to herself indicated the vanity as characteristic of certain forms of insanity. It was over those reference that she gloated not over money, so she was not a miser at all.

BEWARE OF HOUSE FLIES.

Too much importance cannot be attached to this. Regarded hitherto as practically harmless, the common house fly is being proved to be as deadly to human beings as the tsetse fly is to cattle and horses, and the mosquito to those live in parts of the world where malaria and yellow fever are rampant.

To young children, especially, the house fly is a menace. A fly in the milk is such a common occurrence that little notice is taken of it, but mothers and fathers should bear in mind that they may have contaminated the milk to such an extent as to cause acute diarrhoea in any child who drinks it. Experts are agreed that flies are largely responsible for infantile diarrhoea, and frequently cause an epidemic.

Parents, therefore, who wish to safeguard the health of their children, should not neglect to keep the milk covered with fine mesh, in order to prevent flies from getting into it. Furthermore, a war should be waged

against household flies, in order that the danger of other food being tainted with fly blows may be minimized as far as possible.

That typhoid fever has not infrequently been carried from place to place by the agency of flies has been demonstrated over and over again, and will admit of no denial. Flies live and breed in the most fetid atmosphere. They thrive on all sorts of waste and rubbish, and from these carry bacteria of infectious disease.
