

Detroit Whips Leafs Twice Over Week-End; Bruins Defeat Habs

DETROIT, Nov. 20 — (CP) — The defending champion Detroit Red Wings, threatening to make a runaway of the National Hockey League race, tonight whipped Toronto Maple Leafs 5-2 for the second consecutive night.

A standing room crowd of 14,366 saw the Detroiters post their eighth straight win without a setback. The victory put the Red Wings seven points out in front in the N. H. L. race.

As was the case in the Detroiters' 5-2 win at Toronto last night, they blitzed the Stanley Cup champions with a goal-scoring spree. Last night they pored in three goals within a 55-second interval in the second period. Tonight it was three goals within four minutes of the first period after Toronto had taken a 1-0 lead.

Penalties hurt the second-place Leafs as Detroit tallied four times while Leafs were sitting out penalties.

Joe Carveth, who came to Detroit this month in a trade with Montreal, led the Detroit attack with a pair of goals and two assists. It marked the third goal in two nights for Carveth, who got only one in his last 12 games with the Montreal club.

Toronto played without the services of its captain and first-string centre, Ted Kennedy whose auto was involved in a fatality at Toronto last night.

DETROIT 5, TORONTO 2

TORONTO, Nov. 20 — (CP) — A blistering 55-second attack that produced three goals as all Detroit Red Wings needed to give them an easy 5-2 National Hockey League victory over Toronto Maple Leafs Saturday night. The game slowed to a walk at times and the 14,422 fans hooted and stomped for action.

Leafs were without 24-year-old Ted Kennedy, captain and center who was involved in a motor accident while driving to the game from his home at suburban Whiteby. Police said his car, with Kennedy driving, struck two youths walking on the highway, killing one and sending the other to hospital with two broken legs.

Kennedy was not held by police. He was not injured.

Most of the fans were unaware of the accident and they whistled and stamped their feet when Toronto players, obviously off form, missed passes and showed little life.

Wings spotted Toronto a first-period goal by Harry Watson on passes from Bill Ezinicki and Bob Davies. Gerry Couture made it 1-1 just 56 seconds after start of the second and Howie Meeker put Toronto ahead at 6:10.

Then the Wings caught fire. Gordie Howe, free-wheeling Detroit winger, popped in the first of his two goals, setting the spark for a Red Wing offensive. Joe Carveth added another in 41 seconds and Pete Babando applied the clincher 14 seconds later to assure victory.

From that point on — at 8:41 of the period — it was just a matter of playing out the game. Leafs couldn't do a thing against the tricky Detroit club and Howe factored his scoring column early in the third period.

Trend of the game showed in the shots-on-goal analysis. Each got only 23, although many of Toronto's were from long-range.

BOSTON, Nov. 20 — (AP) — Boston's last place Bruins shaded the Montreal Canadiens 2-1 tonight in a scrambling National Hockey League game which drew 12,025 fans to Boston Garden, largest home crowd of the young season.

All the scoring was in the third period and Canadiens' first tally ended 107 minutes and nine seconds of scoreless play in Boston between these two teams. They played a scoreless tie here recently.

The only goal for Montreal, only team in the circuit which has yet to beat the Bruins this season, developed from a pretty piece of work by Leo Gravelle.

In the field trials, Herb Farnsworth was winner of the Derby Stakes and Dr. James F. Weiser won the open all-age stakes.

These three Britany breeders are well-known on the island. Herb Farnsworth and Dr. Weiser having been here again this fall.

Mr. Jones reports that the well-known trainer Tommy Cox and his wife were very keen to come back to the island when the next Field Trials are held here.
